### THE WILLIAMS BRIDGE POST OFFICE by Martin Margulis


In the 1640's, settlers purchased tracts of land from the Indians in what is now the Bronx. Jonas Bronck purchased 500 acres in the southernmost portion of the Bronx in 1641. However, in 1643 the Indians burned Bronck's farm and the family moved further north into what is now southeastern Westchester County. Bronck died very soon thereafter.

Land near what is now Westchester Square/Trogg's Neck was purchased from the Sinoway Indians in 1639/40. John Throckmorton settled what is now Throgg's Neck (a corruption of Throckmorton's name) in 1640 but, like Bronck, was driven off by the Indians. (Those Sinoway Indians who lived near what is now Van Cortland Park were still there during the Revolutionary War. They supported the American cause and were wiped out by the British Army).

In 1658, the Dutch Director-General of New Netherlands authorized a ferry between the Village of Haerlem and "Brouncksland", across the Harlem River. However, the population of Brouncksland was so small that a ferry was not economically feasible. (The authorization was for a privately financed ferry.)

In 1666, the British Governor of New York, Governor Nicolls, gave a charter to Johannes Verveelen to operate a ferry from a site near the present first Avenue and 123rd Street in Manhatten to the Bronx. For this purpose Verveelen built boats and a tavern. Ferry fees and profits from the tavern were to cover his costs. They didn't, since the Harlem River was fordable further north.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE EMPIRE STATE POSTAL HISTORY SOCIETY ON MAY 5, 1985

The annual meeting of the ESPHS was called to order by President Koberg at 1:41 PM at Karrat's Restaurant in New Hartford, NY. Approximately 25 members and guests were in attendance.

The minutes of the semi-annual meeting held on October 7, 1984 were accepted without any additions or corrections. These had been published in the February, 1985 issue of the Bulletin.

The Secretary-Treasurer read his annual report for the 1984-85 year. This report is published in this edition of the Bulletin. The report was accepted as read.

Similarly, the financial report for 1984-85 was presented to the membership. The financial report is also included in full in this issue of the Bulletin. The report shows a deficit of \$350.85 for the year which is due to the difference between the cost of publishing the book on manuscript post office cancels and the receipts to date from the sale of the book. The financial report was accepted as presented.

A brief report on publicity emphasized that news releases on the Society are appearing more frequently in the philatelic press, and news of our activities is becoming more widely known.

Publications chairman Bill Seifert summarized his committees' affairs for 1984-85. The major accomplishment was publication of the manuscript P.O. book which took several years to compile and prepare. One of the main goals of this committee for 1985-86 will be to advertise and promote this book to generate sales.

Bill also offered for free to anyone who was present, old copies of ESPHS journals. In addition, a number of NYS postal history books are currently available through the ESPHS, and these were reviewed.

Articles for the Bulletin are always in short supply, and everyone is encouraged to share their knowledge and their interesting covers through an article in the Bulletin.

Future projects of the publications committee include a booklet on star-type fancy cancels used in NYS by Dave Proulx, and a reference on NYS RFD's by Bill Seifert. Other projects are also being advanced at the current time.

There was no old business to bring before the membership.

Under new business, the Secretary-Treasurer presented a proposed budget for 1985-86. This budget had been reviewed by the Executive Board at its meeting on March 24, 1985, and was agreeable to that body. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to adopt the budget for 1985—86 as read. A copy of the budget is published in this issue of the Bulletin.

Dave Proulx announced that SYRAPEX 86 will be held during April, 1986. This show is sponsored by the Syracuse Stamp Club. Dave also announced that the annual meeting and exhibition of the Postmark Collectors Club will occur at LeMoyne College on August 8-11, 1985 and all postal historians are cordially invited.

President Koberg read a personal statement on the occasion of her descent from the office of president. She acknowledged the assistance and contributions from the membership and other officers of the Society during the last six years. The members present recognized her efforts on behalf of the Society with a well deserved round of applause.

Nominating committee chairman Bill Seifert then announced the slate of candidates that were nominated. They were: Jack Haefeli for president, Ken deLisle for V.P., Maris Tirums for secretary-treasurer, and Dave Proulx, Emma Koberg and John Azarkevich for directors. Also nominated to complete Jack Haefeli's term as director was Charlie Sweeting.

The secretary cast a single vote in favor of the entire slate, and thus the elections were concluded. President elect Haefeli made a brief inauguration statement.

The date and location of the semiannual meeting was determined to be October 6, 1985 at Karrat's Restaurant. The meeting was adjourned at 2:15 PM.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE EMPIRE STATE POSTAL HISTORY SOCIETY FOR 1984-85

#### Membership

The Society continued to attract new members during the 1984-85 year. Applicants found out about ESPHS through personal contact with members and by reading about the Society in the philatelic press. The rate of membership was steady over the year.

The 1984-85 year ends with 196 members. During the year, we had 19 new members, 4 resignations, 9 expulsions, and 2 reinstatements. There were no known deaths.

A number of applications are on hand for posting in the June, 1985 edition of the Bulletin.

### Meetings

The 1984-85 year contained the usual number of meetings of the ESPHS. On May 6 1984, the annual meeting was held, and on October 7, 1984, the semi-annual meeting was conducted. The Executive Board convened two meetings also. These were on the morning of the semi-annual meeting on October 7th and on March 24, 1985. All of the meetings of the ESPHS were at Karrat's Restaurant in New Hartford.

One regional meeting occurred during the year, this on February 3, 1985 in Albany. The Albany regional meeting attracted about 20 members. Arrangements were made by Director Bill Seifert.

The minutes of the general meetings were subsequently published in the Bulletin.

### Bulletin

The Bulletin of the ESPHS was issued on its regular bi-monthly schedule. Editions appeared during June, August, October, and December, 1984, and February and April, 1985. Jack Haefeli continued his editorship during the year. Mailing was handled by Nettie and Bill Seifert.

Substantial cost increases were sustained during the year. Printing costs rose about 30% in mid 1984. On top of that, the first class postage rate rose 10% in early 1985. The Bulletin is mailed by first class postage to make the members' auction timely.

Articles for the Bulletin continue to trickle in. However, there is a constant shortage of postal history material to print, and present contributions will continue to limit expansion of the Bulletin.

#### **Publications**

A major project of the ESPHS came to fruition with the publication of "Manuscript Post Offices of New York." Editing was done by Hanry Chlanda and Chet Wilcox. The forward was authored by Ken deLisle. The publications committee arranged for the photography, typing and printing of the book. The cost of the book was set at \$12. Members are entitled to a 20% discount.

Although no other books were published by the Society during the 1984-85 year, other titles were still available through the Society. "New York Postal History" by Smith & Kay was reordered from APS, and is available to members for \$28.50. "Wayne County Postal History" by Emma Koberg is still available as is the list of federal post offices in New York.

In addition, an independently published book on the postal history of Seneca County was offered to ESPHS members at a preferred price.

The year under review saw several publication projects advance, and this should lead to a number of books on NYS postal history in the years to come.

### Roster

The Society's roster was redistributed with the December, 1984 Bulletin for the first time in several years. The membership information has been computerized thereby making annual revisions of the roster much easier, and it is expected that yearly rosters will now be feasible. The computer work for this was done by Jack Haefeli.

### Awards

The ESPHS was quite active during 1984-85 in sponsoring awards and otherwise recognizing achievements in exhibits of NYS postal history.

A certificate of achievement was presented at COPEX 84 in Cobleskill. A silver award and several certificates were presented at CINCOPEX 84 in Hamilton and at FOPEX 84 in Albany. Finally, a silver award was provided for ROPEX 85 in Rochester. A number of advertisements in show programs were also taken. Ken deLisle handled this activity for ESPHS.

### **Elections**

The 1984 annual meeting saw the election of three directors. Elected to three year terms were Bob Waite, Peter Mason, and Nick Todaro.

A nominating committee was established at the October, 1984 semi-annual meeting consisting of Bill Seifert, George Bernadt, and Gerald Wiley. The committee presented a slate of candidates which includes: Jack Haefeli for president, Ken deLisle for V.P., Maris Tirums for secretary-treasurer, and for directors, Emma Koberg, Dave Proulx, and John Azarkevitch. Also nominated to fill Haefeli's expected vacancy as director was Charlie Sweeting. This slate will be voted on during the 1985 annual meeting.

### FREE FRANK 5 CENT DUE

### ONE HULL OF A POSTMASTER By Nick Todero

Postmasters enjoyed the benefits of the franking privelege from 1799. However the act of March 3, 1845 put an end to the practice. Exemption from postage expence had often been the reason that made the postmastership desirable, and an end to the "PM-Free" surely caused a "Hull-a-baloo" as the old timers would say. The postmaster could however, continue to use the free franking privelege for the transmission of public documents.

At this period BURR HULL was PM at Hull's Corners and the office served about 18 houses, (French's Gazateer). The act of March 2, 1847 (9 stat. 153) restored the free frank privelege to postmasters whose compensation for the previous year did not exceed \$200, providing letters were not more than 1/2 oz sent by or to him on his affairs.

The illustration is a ms FREE B HULL, PM / HULLS CORNERS NY and addressed to messers F Townsend and Co, Albany NY, postmarked with red 32 mm CDS of Fulton, NY, April 10. A manuscript "5" indicates a 5 cent due charge. The letter is datelined Hulls Corners, April 8, 1848.

Could it be that an offical at the Fulton, NY PO was not knowlegable regarding the limited use of the franking privelege?

The author would appreciate comments with other possible conclusions.




The importance of a ferry or bridge across the Harlem River was twofold. it made possible a land route to Albany and the villages in between. Secondly, it made it easier for farmers in the north Bronx and on Long Island to bring their produce and cattle into the New York City market. This was especially important to the Long Island it was very difficult for farmers. them to get their goods to market by water because of the currents at Hell As a consequence, a ferry ran from Long Island to the Bronx, across the East River, (Long Island Sound). The goods then crossed the Bronx (at that time the Town of West Chester) and forded the Bronx River and Harlem River-/Spuyten Duyvil Creek. The latter ford was near what is now 228th Street where the Tibbetts (Tippetts) Creek joined Spuyten Duyvil Creek. The Spuyten Duyvil Creek and Harlem River formed a strait separating the Bronx from Manhattan (see map).


Because the ferry across the Harlem River in the south Bronx was not sufficiently profitable. Verveelen was permitted to move his operation to the fording place across the Spuyten Duyvil Creek. The ford was fenced off. A schedule of fees was set and a tavern built. Government personnel were permitted free use of the ferry.

At this time provision was also made for a similar service across the Bronx River at what is now Williams The facility, in this case a Bridge. bridge, was built by John Williams, a farmer in the area. He was helped, financially and otherwise, by Messrs Betts. Tippett and Hadden, landowners in the area who also had farms in the Town of East Chester. They were given free use of the bridge. A tavern was built, as per specification, near the The ford was fenced off here bridge. Roads were built connecting also. Williams Bridge with Verveelen's ferry as well as with the villages of West Chester and West Farms. (The villages were both in the Town of West Chester, as was Williams Bridge.)

In 1673, monthly overland mail service was started between New York City and Boston, and villages in between. Convenient spots, stores and inns primarily, were selected, at which mail and packages were picked up and left. Thus Verveelen's ferry and Williams Bridge became, in effect, post offices. The service did not prosper, and was discontinued.

In 1685 the service was restarted. A fee was set at three cents per hundred miles for letters. The service prospered this time, possibly because of the increased population, and in





1698 the schedule called for weekly service in the spring, summer and fall. Winter service was to be bi-weekly. In 1754, when Benjamin Franklin became postmaster, the service was put on a weekly basis all year round.

Mail coaches were put on the line in 1772. These coaches also carried passengers. Originally they ran every two weeks. The service was so popular that the coaches were soon scheduled for twice a week and then three times a week. All this mail passed through Williams Bridge and on to New Rochelle en route to Boston.

In 1690, the Provincial Assembly authorized (but failed to allocate money for) a bridge to be called the King's Bridge to replace Verveelen's ferry. It was built by Frederick Philipse in 1693, at which time the ferry ceased operations.

At the end of the Revolutionary War. things returned to normal in the Bronx. The 1790 census lists a population of 1.761 persons. including slaves. Inhabitants were listed by family name. The families were divided into male and female members. Males were classified by age group, females only as adult or child. Slaves were listed under the owners' family name.

With the establishment of the national government, provisions were made for toll roads to West Farms and West Chester Village (1790's). The road to and through West Farms continued on across the northern Bronx until it joined the Old Boston Road. The stage coaches to Boston ran over this new branch of the Boston Post Road. West Farms became the first official post

office in the Town of West Chester in 1811. resulting in the bypassing of Williams Bridge.

Another blow to Williams Bridge's importance came with the invention of the steamboat, which allowed for direct shipment of Long Island farm produce to New York City. Steam powered boats were able to overcome the Hell Gate currents.

The building of the New York and Harlem Railroad lead to Williams Bridge becoming a post office again. The railroad reached Williams Bridge in 1842 and opened the area to the less affluent. The 1865 census showed 543 inhabitants in the area. Much of the land, especially west of the Bronx River, consisted of large estates. East of the river, near the area where the Williamsbridge (now Gun Hill) Road crossed what is now White Plains Road, the area was subdivided into small lots.

The hamlet of Williams Bridge itself was small (see map). While subdivided. most of the land was unoccupied. It contained the railroad station, a post office (in a store), a school. and express office, two stables, a telegraph agency, a saloon, a carpentry shop, a wool shed, railroad yards, and two hotels. It also had a number of stores. It was not too far from the Jerome Race Track and just south of the area where the New Haven Railroad joined the New York and Harlem Railroad. The hamlet would thus seem to have been a communications and transportation hub for the surrounding area as well as a shopping center. It also had the only school in the area.

The first United States Post Office at Williams Bridge was opened on August 16, 1849. Benjamin Valentine, Jr was the Postmaster. It was discontinued on May 11, 1852. The office reopened on December 2, 1853 with John T Briggs as postmaster. On February 8, 1869, the name of the post office was changed to Jerome. Mr Briggs continued as postmaster. In 1870, he was receiving a salary of \$130 per year. This was less than one third the compensation of the postmaster of West Farms (\$430), and one fifth that of the postmaster of West Chester (\$670). Only the postmaster of City Island received less (\$557).

The name of the Jerome Post Office was changed back to Williams Bridge on December 4, 1884. The postmaster at this time was John E Burke. Mail to Williams Bridge (and Jerome) arrived by train. When the name of the post office was changed to Jerome, its location was moved across the Bronx River and back into the Town of West Chester. Prior to that it had been in the Town of West Farms, which became part of New York City in 1875.

Williams Bridge ceased to be a post office on December 13, 1895, shortly after the Town of West Chester and other areas in what is now Bronx County were made a part of New York City. At the time, Elizabeth Heilman was postmistress.

On January 1, 1898, a post office was re-established at Williams Bridge. It consisted of a superintendent, 3 clerks and 6 carriers. It was designated Station "N". This time it was part of the New York City Post Office. It continued as part of the New York City system until October 3, 1962, at which time the Bronx Post Office was established.

The hamlet of Williams Bridge became a part of what is now Bronx Park and thus has ceased to exist. The railroad station was rebuilt outside the park limits, and is still in use. A viaduct crosses the valley of the Bronx River where the hamlet had once been. The bridge itself is long gone.


