1992: 25TH ANNIVERSARY GALA

A PROGRESS REPORT BY KEN DE LISLE



The initial step toward our 25th anniversary celebration was taken in October 1990 when then President Hart appointed Class 1993 Directors Dr. Louis Call Jr., Charles Edwards and Gerald Wiley to explore the possibilities inherent in this important milestone. Suggestions were exchanged between the committee members and reported at the 1991 ESPHS Annual Meeting.

A number of activities were recommended, including but not limited to: convention, exhibition, floor auction, awards banquet. It was realized that such an undertaking was virtually impossible working alone because of our scattered membership. However the prospect brightened when the committee considered a joint event with an already established show. Since many of our members belong to clubs associated with CINCOPEX, a rotating show in central New York State, we looked for a way to join them. The 1992 CINCOPEX will take place in Rome, NY in the fall. The 25th Anniversary Committee already has made contact with persons associated with that show and will work to formalize events and activities. The ESPHS Board of Directors has authorized the Committee to proceed at its discretion. At the 1991 Annual Meeting, incoming President Margulis added Ken de Lisle, a life member and former secretary-treasurer, to the committee.

Our 1992 celebration will be kicked off in conjunction with CINCOPEX 1991, to be held October 12-13 in Sidney, NY, in the Masonic Temple. President Margulis has authorized the holding of our regular semi-annual meeting at the show on Sunday, October 13.

We have guaranteed the show a minimum of 50 6-page frames in their competitive open exhibition. Postal history will be the thrust of our participation of course, but it is an

open show and we encourage our members who have a traditional or topical exhibit to help make this a worthwhile effort. There will be a trophy for the best non-postal history exhibit by an EHPHS member, be it stamps, covers, topicals, whatever, just so it is *not* what we normally class as postal history.

Many of our members, whom we know have exhibited, and won nice awards, at past CINCOPEX shows, will be receiving an invitation to participate in this kick-off event. We urge all who are exhibitors or would-be exhibitors to write for details. There is a modest entry fee -- very modest -- of \$1.00 per 6-page frame. For those details, a prospectus and entry forms write to: Ken de Lisle, 9 Circle Lane, Apt. 23-D, Albany, NY 12203-2216.

Come on now, we have at least 50 6-page frames to fill. With our membership that should be a breeze. Make your plans to attend the meeting, visit the *bourse* where dealers have fresh material aimed at your collecting interest.

For those who would like to exhibit but cannot attend be assured that a member of our Committee will oversee the mounting of your entry and its safe de-mounting. If you are able to deliver your entry to a Committee member we will hand carry your material to the show, set it up, take it down and return it to you as received, untouched by USPS. What more can you ask — let us have your entry now!!

It will honor the 50th anniversary of the last use in the United States of a machine flag cancel, that of nearby Sidney Center, in 1941. The souvenir cover will have a pictorial hand cancel of the traditional flag strike and the cachet will be a picture of the 1941 Sidney Center Post

A stuffer card will tell the story of this interesting postal history item. Covers can be obtained at the show or by mail from Franklin Rudd, 614 N. James Street, Rome, NY 13440. Covers will be franked with an appropriate flag stamp. Mail orders should include a #10 SASE plus the price of the covers at \$1.25 each.

THE CIVIL WAR: A UNION SOLDIER WRITES HOME

CONTRIBUTED BY LAWRENCE ROBILLARD

This article is comprised of four letters written by a Union soldier, Milo Felton. He had been hospitalized for an arm wound. This had caused problems with his pay. By his last letter he has pretty much recovered and is looking forward to getting out of the hospital.

Mr. Robillard's transcription of the original letters follows. We have reproduced part of one of them in its original, handwritten form. We have also reproduced the envelopes

in which they were sent.

By Fairfax Seminary Hospital near Alexandria Va. March 31, 1864

Mr. Moody,

I am now at present in the above service hospital, quite sick, I was mustered in for my regular pay at the regiment, but as I am here I cannot get it, therefore I wish you to send me five dollars as soon as possible, I expect to come home on furlough before long, I am at present pretty sick, but I think if I get home I shall be better. Gilbert Herrington, Henry Evans, Alvin Wilkinson and Sliman Bean are coming home too on furlough. I feel so miserable that I can not think of much to write therefore you must excuse my short letter please Standard circular postmark from Alexandria, VA with target cancel.

write as soon as you get this, no more at present. Yours most truly Milo H. Felton

Citty Point Va. Aug. 1, 1864

To Mr. Amos Moody

Dear Sir.

I thought that perhaps a few lines from me would be interesting to you at this time, as I have lived with you & in your family, it seems like home to me, but now I am far away & in a strange land among strangers yet surrounded by fellow soldiers engaged in the cause with me but, it has been my fortune if I may call it such to get wounded I now am in in the hospital at this place, my wound is not I trust of a serious character the ball hit the second finger on my right hand took off about half of the nail & end of the same, then struck my left arm above the wrist & came out near the elbow making quite a long flesh wound think it did not hit the bone, this was done July 30 on Saturday last it will lay me up for some time at least before I shall be able to again take the field yet, I am in good health & spirits otherwise, I have not received any letter from you since the middle of July, we have not been paid off yet & do not know when we shall & now a little would get me some comfort that I cannot get with in if you can send me five dollars it would be very acceptable

at this time & I will make it right with you when I get my pay, when you write let me know how you got along with your haying and all that you think will interest me when you write Direct to

Mr. Amos Moody Sir,


I wrote to you from City Point on the first of the month, but as I was removed from there on the 3rd, I did not receive your reply, but I left my father at

that place so expect he will have it for me, My arm is doing very well now and I am in hopes it will come out as well as ever in the course of time, but the wounds are quite large & will require quite a while to heal. If you write to your brother in New York, he can come and see me if he chooses to the regular visiting days are Tuesdays and Fridays, but he can come in to see a patient on any other day as well.

If you should here [sic] from father I wish you would write to him and let him know that I am getting on well, for paper & envelopes are by no means plentiful here, and cannot write myself, I cannot think of anything more I want to say at present so must conclude.



Willets point Sept. 29th, 1864 Grant Hospital

Dear Friend

I was on a furlough when you wrote to me last and I did not receive your letter until I came back, which was a few days ago, So that I will now hasten to answer it. I got back safe on tuesday just at dinner time and the doctor that was here when I went away is sick, but the boys that saw my arm before I went away thinks that my arm looks a great deal better, and I think it will get well fast, I should like to know what kind of time you had at the fair, and also how you are getting along with your work, I should like to have you write how Sargeant Squires is getting along and whether he is sick or not, you must give my Best Respects to Mr. Geary's & Mr. Daggetts folks, I could not bring any paper or envelopes with me without messing it all up, So I would like to have you send me a sheet of paper & an envelope when you write. I have got a few postage stamps with me, please to write as soon as you get this and write all the news, Our regiment has left Washington and I wish you would try and find out where father is and let me know so that I can write to him, I cannot think of any more at this time, but I will try and think of more next time, So I will bid you good by for this time while I remain your sincere friend.





CHAPPAQUA POST OFFICE: THE END OF AN ERA CONTRIBUTED BY TERENCE HINES

Chappaqua got a railroad station in the late 1840's. This was followed by a post office which opened on June 13th, 1850. David F. Britt was the first postmaster. In 1860, according to French's NYS Gazeteer, it was still too small to be a hamlet. However, times change.





Figure 1: The old post office.

Saturday, November 17, 1990 was the last day of operations for the Chappaqua post office at its location along North Greeley Avenue. The space at this location was rented and was quite small, consisting of approximately 3,400 square feet. The front of the location is shown in figure 1, although the UNITED STATES POST OFFICE sign will not show. The post office occupied the lower right portion of the building shown, including all space on the ground floor to the right of the Scarborough Gallery. The post office had been at this location since the late 1950s.




Figure 2: The new post office at 107 N. Greeley Ave.

On Monday, November 19, the Chappaqua office opened at its new location at 107 North Greeley Avenue. This is an entirely new building with 12,000 square feet of space and is shown in figure 2. Construction of the new post office began late in 1989. Initially, the move to the new building was planned for November 12, 1990, but problems with the telephone lines put the move off for a week.

Clarence Jones has been postmaster of Chappaqua for many years and still is. There was no press coverage of the move, nor was there any Post Office Department ceremony.


Figure 4: Last day of use cover from old post office

I made up ten last and first day covers on the 17th and 19th. An example of the last day cover is shown in figure 4 and a first day of use cover is shown in figure 3. If any reader would like a set, they are available for \$2 (mint postage is fine) from me at Box 629, Chappaqua, NY 10514-0629.



KINGS COUNTY POST OFFICES BY ROY AHLOUIST

Brooklyn was once known as the "City of Churches". The city had a reputation of being inordinately clean and the streets lined with trees. In size and population the city ranked third in the United States, and, though there were many businesses in Brooklyn, it was also the bedroom community of New York City. Such are a few of the observations made by Willard Glazier in 1883.


However the Village of Brooklyn was only part of Kings County. There were a number of other towns also. One of these was Gravesend the site of a farm community of British families seeking the religious freedom that they could not get in Massachusetts. Therefore Kings County and Brooklyn had a long history of settlement and development prior

uncovered. The postmaster listings are also incomplete. What is listed has been derived from the following sources:

The first official post office in Brooklyn was established July 1, 1803, and P. Buffit was the postmaster. The United States Navy established a naval yard at Wallabout Bay during 1807. By 1810 the population was 4,402. Brooklyn became an incorporated village April 12, 1816. Whether P. Buffit remained as postmaster is not known, but a Joel Bruce holds the appointment in 1819. A year later the population was tallied at 7,175. It is interesting that Manuscript Post Offices of New York State shows the earliest recorded postmark as February 8, 1821 and the last as August 30, 1826. However, The American Stampless Cover Catalog lists a purple circle

to the establishment of the first post office in the Village of Brooklyn in 1803. The limits of this article are set at the establishment of this Post Office up until the city of Brooklyn, which was the same as Kings County, joined New York City in 1898. The Brooklyn Post Office however never was incorporated into the New York City Post Office and remains an independent entity.

As noted above, Brooklyn has several meanings. In the course of this discussion "Brooklyn" will refer to all that became the Borough of Brooklyn while "Brooklyn" refers to the village, or that area which was the village. The other villages have separate names so this problem will not arise with them.

There are many gaps in the information. If something has not been mentioned, it is likely that it has not been

in 1818 and another circle in red or black from 1825--39. Prior to 1818 Brooklyn used a manuscript postmark.

Spafford's 1824 Gazateer of the State of New York notes that "the post office is located in the village [of Brooklyn]", which would place it just across from the Battery on Manhattan Island. (The Flat Bush Post Office was also in operation at the time.) Brooklyn is noted as the center for the stage coaches and roads to Long Island. Also significant was the recently completed plank turnpike with a tollbridge over the Wallabout Bay which joined Brooklyn to the town of Bushwick and the towns of Newton and Flushing in Queens. Other roads had been built previously to Suffolk and what is now Nassau Counties on Long Island.

By 1835 the population had leaped to 24,529. This rapid

growth in population resulted in the town and village incorporating as a city on April 8, 1834. Originally, the city was divided into 9 wards, but the number of wards grew to 25 by 1880. In 1840 the post office was located at 68 Fulton Street near Hicks Street.

In 1854 Daniel Van Voohis was the postmaster. By that time (1855) the population had jumped to 205,250. About 35,000 of these came from the City of Williamsburgh and the town of Bushwick which incorporated with Brooklyn effective April 17, 1854. Earlier, Williamsburgh received mail directly from New York City, while later (1868), mail was processed through the Brooklyn Post Office. It is probable that the routing change came about at the time of the political consolidation.

William W. Peck is listed as postmaster in 1859 and again in 1861, so it is reasonable to assume that he maintained the appointment for that period anyway. Thomas Kinsella held the appointment in 1867. Samuel Booth had it in 1870, Charles C. Talbot in 1876 and Joseph C. Hendrix in 1890. The consolidation with New York City seems to have had no effect on the Brooklyn Post Office. On the other hand, as Brooklyn absorbed other villages, towns and cities, the mail was then funneled through the Brooklyn Post Office.

During the 1880s the Brooklyn Post Office was on Washington Street, just north of City Hall. This is in the same general area as the original village though any semblance of a delineation between communities disappeared in

the early part of this century. It is interesting that the population of Brooklyn (Kings County) is 599,495 in 1880, of which 566,663 lived in Brooklyn. That means that only some 3,000 people lived in more than half the land area of the county.

FLATBUSH POST OFFICE


Flatbush was an early Dutch settlement. The location is almost central in Brooklyn. A post office was established in the village August 16, 1814. The postmaster was Abraham VanDeveer. It is probable that the location was near presentday Flatbush and Church Avenues for it was where the Dutch Reformed Church and Erasmus Academy were (and still are).

The postmasters at this designation seemed to have held their appointments for extended periods of time. Abraham VanDeveer is listed again in 1819, indicating that he held the appointment for more than five years. By 1854, R. L. Schoonmaker was postmaster and his name appears again in 1859 and 1861. By 1867, Miss Phebe J. Case was postmaster and is listed again in 1870. Gilbert Hicks held the appointment in 1876, and in 1890, the postmaster was Charles L. Zellinsky.

In 1894 Flatbush became a part of the City of Brooklyn and its post office became part of the Brooklyn Post Office. It was designated as Station F, Brooklyn but continued to be known as Flatbush. In 1896 the name of the station was

> changed to Station L and in 1898 again changed back to Flatbush. Almost all Kings County post offices got letter designations when they joined the City of Brooklyn. Some reverted to their pre-consolidation names in 1898, but some did not. Some never got letter designations. There seems to have been no consistent policy in this matter.

> There is no listing in Sampson for the Flatbush Post Office, but manuscript postmarks are known as early as February 19, 1816, and up to the stamp period of Scott #26. Indications (supported by Phillips, above) are that Flatbush stampless covers are all manuscript, and that a canceller was first used by Post-

master R. L. Schoonmaker. (Incidentally, the name used at the time was Flat Bush.)

Flatbush was the county seat in the early years though one would think it would have been Brooklyn. The two were joined by the turnpike, which is now known as Flatbush Avenue.

Flatbush had a population of 1,159 in 1810. A decade later the population had declined to 1,027. From there each census shows a slight gain until 1860 when there were 3,471 inhabitants. By 1880, the population doubled and the City of Brooklyn had greater than a tenfold increase. It is easy to understand why the county seat was changed. (The loss of New Lots in 1852 only represented 2,261 people. By 1880, over 13,000 people lived in New Lots.)

WILLIAMSBURGH POST OFFICE

In 1824, Williamsburgh was recorded as a small village in the town of Bushwick. The location of Williamsburgh was adjacent to the northern boundary of Brooklyn. To the north and east of Bushwick was the county of Queens while west is the East River which joins New York Bay to Long Island Sound. All of Bushwick had a count of 798 people in 1810, and a decade later the count had grown only to 930. Two events were instrumental in the rapid growth of Bushwick in the years to 1835 when the Population reached 3,325. One was Peck's ferry established 1835, from Peck's Slip in Manhattan to the foot of Grand Street in Kings County around which Williamsburgh grew. The ferry

passed to Manhattan at Corlear's Point. The other was the Brooklyn-Jamaica Turnpike which cut travel time between the two points by 1 1/2 hours. However the main reason was that the area of Brooklyn nearest to New York City was filled and Williamsburg was now the closest area to New York which had room for new housing. The turnpike passed along the shore to Peck's Ferry and then turned east on what was to become Grand Street.

The Village of Williamsburgh was incorporated in 1827. In 1830, the business section was on Kent Avenue between Grand and N. First Street. A post office was established February 10, 1829, with Lewis Sanford, one of the first village trustees, as postmaster. It operated in Cooke's Drug Store in about four feet which had been cordoned off from the rest of the store. Cooke's Drug Store was on N. First Street, which only extended three blocks from the shore to the turnpike in 1833. Cooke sold paints and oils as well as more traditionally items.

Chlanda and Wilcox list the earliest known manuscript postmark for Williamsburgh as March 31, 1832. They must have continued to be used until 1844 for that is the first listing in Phillips for a handstamp.

In 1840 Williamsburgh became a city, population 5,046. By 1854, it had joined with Brooklyn and the Town of Bushwick to form an incorporated City of Brooklyn with George Hall as the first mayor.

The post office was relocated to Grand Street (later, when numbers were introduced, it became number 16 which appears just north of First Street on the 1845 map.)

The postmaster was Hiram Ross, who operated the Williamsburgh Post Office in a "circular shaped corner in Latham Coffee and Cake Saloon." At the time the mail came from New York via the Flushing Stage owned and operated by a man named Byrd. He stopped in the morning on his way to Pearl and Dover Streets in New York City when he took the outgoing mail and delivered the incoming mail. The stage also carried passengers at a rate of 25 cents.

By 1854 the postmaster was John T. Runcie. Thomas Goodwin is listed as postmaster in 1859 and 1861. Regular city mail delivery started in all first class post offices in 1863.

In that letters were now to be delivered to the addressee, it was necessary that street names and numbers be included in an address. The Post Office still used the city directory to determine an address if street and number were not written on the envelope.

Eugene Armbruster wrote in his book that a Mike Rohrer was a letter carrier for the XV Ward of Williamsburgh. The carrier would collect money due on letters received, or money to mail a letter. The post office sold the stamps and stamped envelopes, but many people did not keep a supply of either at home. Also, he wrote, the idea of letter boxes had not yet come into being. Most people took an old shoe and nailed it to the door for the newspaper, when it was delivered by mail.

Levi Darbee was postmaster in 1867. He was a printer who originally came from Manhattan in 1838, when he purchased the Williamsburgh Gazette and Long Island Advertiser from either the founder, Francis G. Fish, or Andrascus Fish. Darbee added a printing plant. He published a daily between 1850 and 1854, and then gave up the newspaper, but continued printing under the name Levi Darbee & Son. The Williamsburgh Gazette was published at a shop that was between Bedford Avenue and Driggs. Darbee's home was on Bedford, four or five houses from the plant. Bedford appears to be the old N. Tenth in 1845, and Driggs Eleventh.

James Semlen was postmaster in 1870. At this time the post office was located in the Wall House, which later

became the Hotel Boswyck, at 371 S. 5th Street, the corner. Wall House was built about 1855 on the east corner of Bedford Avenue and South 5th Street (74 to 78 on Fourth Street). Richard Hicky bought the hotel under the name Hotel Bostyck in 1893. When the Williamsburgh Bridge was constructed, the hotel had to be demolished.

The Williamsburgh Post Office now occupied a room the size of a small store when it was located in the Wall House. It covered the areas of Williamsburgh, Bushwick and North Brooklyn. (Eastern District) There were three routes, two to the thirteenth and fourteenth wards, and the third covered the other sections. Thirteen letter carriers and four clerks handled the postal service of the 13, 14, 15, 16, 18 and 19 wards. The 17th ward, Greenpoint, did not have a population to warrant delivery. They either picked up their mail or paid a Private carrier two cents for delivery.

On September 3, 1873, the Williamsburgh Post Office was redesignated Station W of the Brooklyn Post Office. According to Smith and Kay there were numerous cosmetic changes in the status of the former Williamsburgh Post Office. A branch post office was established at 656 Wallabout Street where previously Charles Somers and Sons had run a plumbing business. When they retired, the post office took over the store and remained there for years. It is assumed that the post office remained at that same location until after the formation of greater New York.

I am trying to obtain more information about the two covers illustrated below. Any assistance readers can provide will be appreciated.




Figure 1: Letter 1 carried out of the mail Buffalo to Albany.




Figure 2: Letter 2 stamped with carmine "C."

Letter 1 (figure 1) was apparently carried out of the mails from Buffalo to Albany where it arrived after June 16, 1845. What do the markings "PPBK" and "SUWPP" stand for? Can they be Canal Packet markings? Letter 2 (figure 2) went from Albany to Little Falls prepaid by a Scott #11. The "C" in the lower left corner is in carmine. There are no markings on the back. What is the purpose of the "C." The owner speculated it was a charge marking. I find no such usage mentioned in the L.F. Post Office papers.
