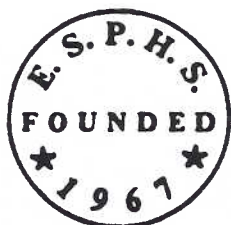
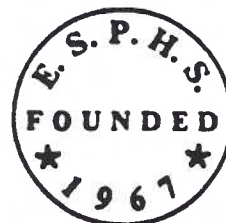

## MANUSCRIPT POST OFFICES OF ORANGE COUNTY BY MARTIN MARGULIS

In the past few years *La Posta* has organized studies of various postal markings. Committees were set up to coordinate the work which consisted mainly of trying to learn how many post offices could have used a given marking and then to find examples of the marking on cover. Copies of the covers were sent to the state coordinator who collated the information and sent an update to *La Posta* for publication. Periodically the updates were incorporated into the previous reports and a revised report containing all known information on a given marking was published. Jack Haefeli was *La Posta*'s NYS Doane coordinator.

With this in mind, I compared my Orange County manuscript postmark covers against those listed in Chlanda and Wilcox in terms of inclusion in the list and the date of their earliest known use. I found I had a few covers which were not listed, which is not too surprising.

What I couldn't know were the names of those post offices not listed because no covers had been found from them with manuscript postmarks. To learn this I had to go to Kay and Smith to find out which Orange County P.O.'s were established prior to 1865. I then collated the Chlanda & Wilcox list with the names of the post offices in Kay & Smith. I also entered in the date on which each post office

was established. In most cases ten or more years had elapsed between the post office's date of establishment and the earliest known manuscript usage. I next wrote in the date listed in Phillip's *American Stampless Cover Catalog (ASCC)* for the use of hand stamped postmarks. Many post offices were neither in Chlanda & Wilcox nor the *ASCC*, since no covers were known from them. Some had been around for a number of years, too.

If you were interested in learning about the names of potential manuscript-using post offices in your county, you could use this method. The *ASCC* only goes up to 1856, the end of the stampless period. However in Orange County at least, post offices were using manuscript postmarks up until the 1880's.

All Orange County P.O.'s before 1860, and some later, used manuscript postmarks. Only post offices opened prior to 1865 or those opened later which are known to have used manuscript postmarks are listed. Wardsbridge (1814/15) and West Point (1818) used hand stamp post marks some time within their manuscript period and then dropped them. Lawton and Leptondale used manuscript post marks until the 1880's. Some other little post offices might have used them even later.

## PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Eleven ESPHS members attended the Society meeting at Stampshow '91, which isn't too bad considering the lack of publicity about it. Among those present were Bob Harris, who delivered a talk, William Bauer, John Cali, Alan Parsons, Dr. Arthur Groton and Brad Arch. I apologize to those other members whose names I did not get.

On Friday, members William Hart, Walter Demmerle and Henry Chlanda attended the show. I also spoke to members John Kay and Sidney Fingerhood who attended as representatives of the Mobile Post Office Society.

I helped man the APS Affiliates' table and had a good chance to talk to Robert de Violini, Chairman of the Affiliates' Coordinating Committee, about a greater role for the state affiliates in the governance of APS. As I see it, this could result in more APS cooperation in recruiting state members. Mr. de Violini said he would study this matter and see what could be done.

I spoke to one of the officers of the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors who assured me that any AAPE published materials could be utilized by ESPHS to help "educate" its members about better exhibiting practices. Of course, attribution of the material to AAPE would have to be made, but this is only common courtesy. I said I would join and an application should be en route to me.

Returning to Bob Harris' talk, it concerned using Congressional reports to help reconstruct mail routes which could then be mapped for either individual counties or the entire state. The talk was well received, although there was no agreement on how ESPHS would help in this project. My own feeling was that when an outline of the book was finished, Bob and Dr. Groton would seek out interested people who would pay a pre-publication price for the book.

I discussed with Bill Welch, editor of the *American Philatelist*, our use of some of the material in the Kay & Smith book on NYS Post Offices in updating *Manuscript Postmarks of NYS*. He was noncommittal, as this might affect the sale of the Kay & Smith book. John Kay had no objections to our use of his books for this purpose as he agreed that *Manuscript Postmarks* needed updating.

Although I mentioned it under my other hat as editor, I am writing it again. Dues are due!! Send them to Maris or pay him at Sidney. Also, we will vote at the Sidney meeting on raising dues to ten dollars per year. This was agreed to by vote at the Utica meeting. The Sidney vote would make it official.

## CHARLES SWEETING HONORED

### PRESENTATION BY EMMA KOBERG

In 1967, Charles Sweeting and Harry Taber discussed the possibility of forming a group with interest in the postal history of New York State. Others with similar interests were contacted. A meeting was held, and the decision to form the EMPIRE STATE POSTAL HISTORY SOCIETY was made.

Formal organization was held at CENTOPEX -- A PHILATELIC EXHIBITION held April 29-30, 1967 at the War Memorial Building in Syracuse, N.Y.

There were 10 members present, and Charles Sweeting was elected president for a two year term. Sweeting was reelected in 1969, but gave up the office when he moved from the area. During his term of office, many projects were initiated. Some of them are:

- Lists of machine cancels
- County lists of postmasters
- Writing of a constitution

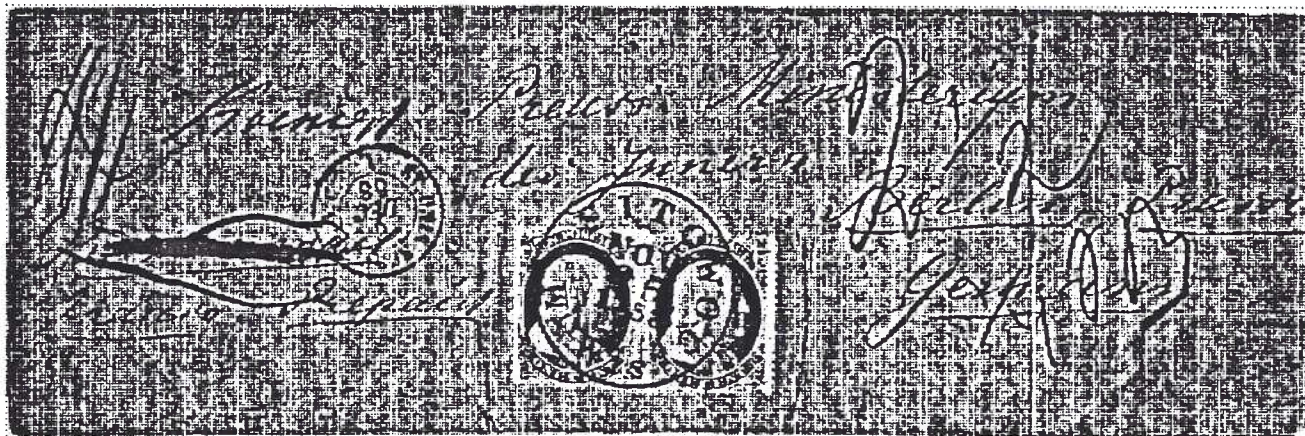
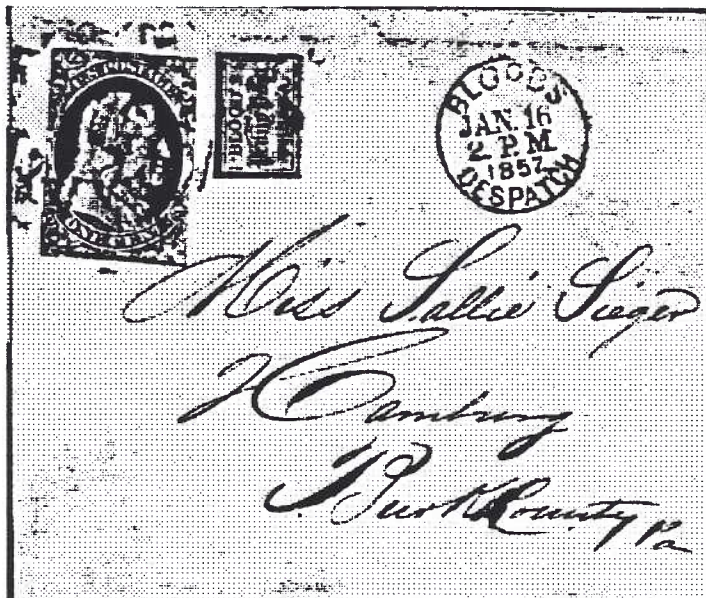


# SCARCE WRAPPERS FROM THE BANCHIK COLLECTION

## 1851 Type II

*Blood's 1 cent bronze on lilac, used to pay printed matter rate, local fee. Local is acid tied. Unusual in combination with 1 cent, more often seen with 3cent on letters. Ex Ishikawa.*



## 1857 Type V

*Manitowoc, Wisc. to Berlin Nov. 15, 1858. Two cent overseas rate. Endorsed per Bremen Mails, routed via England by British Mail, then in transit to France. U.S. postage paid only to England. Blue manuscript "2-1/2" (silbergroschen) is the Prussian due marking for British and French transit plus domestic postage.*

## STATUS REPORT ON CINCOPEX 1991 EXHIBIT AND BOURSE BY KEN DE LISLE

We have a report from Art Carver, Chairman of CINCOPEX 1991, regarding the status of our fifty 6-page frame commitment. Entries are quite disappointing, to say the least. As of August 10 we have 4 (FOUR!) entries with 29 frames, 13 from one member alone.

We can do much better than this. Perhaps it may seem a little early, but October 12 is not that far away, especially if one has to check through an old exhibit or set up a new one. A poor entry level does not bode well for our 25th Anniversary Celebration 1992 when we had hoped to have a really big postal history exhibit and bourse. ## ROPEX NEEDS EXHIBITORS

ROPEX, the annual Rochester Philatelic Exhibition, will be held next year from Friday, March 27th through Sunday, March 29th. ROPEX is one of the two World Series of Philately shows held in New York State, the other being INTERPEX, which is held in New York City.

At the present time, ROPEX is seeking exhibits for the show. Frames, which hold sixteen pages, are six dollars. Each exhibit may have a maximum of ten frames; the minimum is one frame. A fee for the return of exhibits is required unless the exhibitor is picking it up.

Exhibit space is usually totally allocated by early December, so if you are interested in exhibiting, you should apply soon. Official entry forms can be obtained from ROPEX, 130 Trafalgar St., Rochester, NY 14619.

I have discussed with Bill Hart the holding of a regional meeting during the show. This was done

previously with satisfactory results. Mr. Hart will look into this. It would also be nice if ESPHS had a table at the show. Of course, this would require members' help in manning it.

I hope that our members will consider exhibiting at this show and at INTERPEX in New York City. ESPHS will provide awards as required by the number of entries. I gather we have some very nice prizes. Obviously, ROPEX will provide its own awards from bronze to gold. If we are to have a higher profile, at least in New York State, we must exhibit and have tables at major shows. Right now, most of our members live in the central part of the state. Membership in the metropolitan New York area is growing. We must provide more activities for the western part of the state. Participation in ROPEX is one of the ways to do this.



# THE UNITED STATES' LAST REGULAR FLAG CANCEL

The CINCOPEX 91 stamp show in the Masonic Temple, Sidney, N.Y., on Oct. 12-13 has as its theme the 50th anniversary of the last machine flag cancel.

The last known use in the United States of a machine flag cancel was in 1941 at Sidney Center, N.Y. Flag cancel machines date from 1894 and were made largely by the American Postal Supply Co. until 1925. The particular machine that was the last in use was made in 1911 and was bought by three clerks in the Sidney, N.Y. post office, having a capacity of 250 letters per minute. It was used there until sold in 1928 to the Sidney Center post office, it being replaced at Sidney by a new electric-powered canceller.

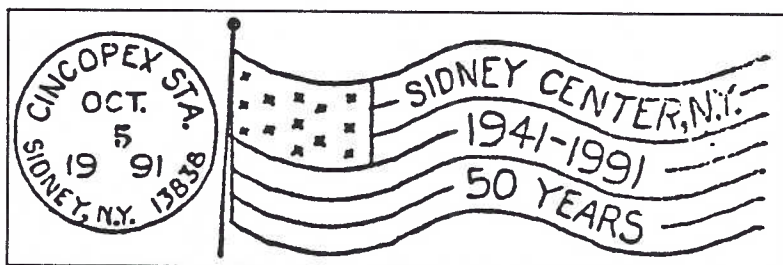
Sidney Center continued to use the now obsolescent machine, but flag cancel machines were gradually being retired across the country during the 1930's, and the remaining ones became worn and made many defective partial strikes. In 1941 it was no longer possible to obtain type for the year date and Sidney Center reverted to hand cancels, but an ingenious mechanic filed down the rather straight-sided "0" of 1940 and converted it into a slightly bent "1" to make 1941, and its use was resumed on Jan 22, 1941.

The Post Office Department was not to be put off and flatly ordered the retirement of the machine as of May 27, 1941, but so many requests from collectors were received that a special favor cancel was applied on Dec. 31, 1941, to end the flag cancel era just half a century ago this year.

The show cancel will feature a flag cancel of the type used at Sidney Center and the show covers will have a photo of the 1941 Sidney Center P.O. Covers will be franked with various flag stamps—the Mt. Rushmore, Flags on Parade, Flag with Olympic Rings, "F" plastic ATM and the 25-cent and 4-cent flag stamps.

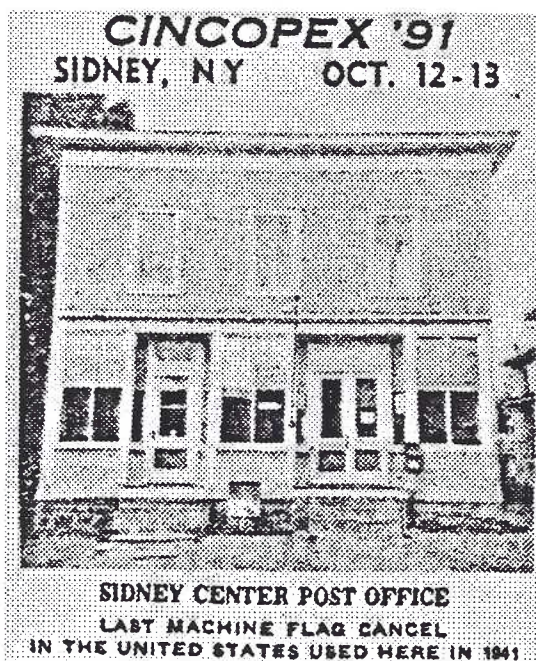
Covers are \$1.25 each or \$5.50 for a set of five with different stamps. They may be obtained from Franklyn Rudd, 614 N. James St., Rome, N.Y. 13440. A large SASE is required. A show prospectus is available from Art Carver, RD 1, Bx 511, Norwich, N.Y. 13815. There will be a show banquet at the Masonic Temple on Saturday night.

CINCOPEX is jointly sponsored by five upstate New York clubs from Rome, Utica, Sherrill, Hamilton and Sidney. The show will host the Empire State Postal History Society's fall meeting on Sunday afternoon.

Two years ago, I wrote about using the *Bulletin* as a means of updating Chlanda & Wilcox's *Manuscript Post Offices of New York State* (1984). A two part update was published in the *Bulletin* in 1987 which is now out of print. The format of the update is, in my opinion, difficult to use and useless without the original book. It would seem that what is needed is a complete revision of the original book, but this is not feasible as we have too many copies on hand to just throw them away.

I have spoken with Henry Chlanda, Jack Haefeli, Maris Timms and Bill Seifert, and they agree updating is overdue.

I am open to suggestions as to how we should proceed. In my opinion, all the old information should be put on a computer. (Doug Penwell may already have done this.) All members should be asked to submit any new information that they may have on manuscript postmarks to a state-wide coordinator. The new information developed should be collated into the computer-based list. Updates could appear in the *Bulletin* or be published independently. Eventually a revised edition of Chlanda & Wilcox will need to be published. This should come under the Publication Committee's budget. Your opinions and suggestions are solicited.

*On the following pages you will find illustrations of eight manuscript covers. The oldest cover, from Newburgh to Albany, rated 25 cents is no doubt a double rate cover. The 17 cent rate is for 151 to 300 miles during the period 1799 through 1816: Canterbury being a few miles south of Newburgh paid the higher rate. The Chester FLS also was covered by*

*this rate plus the 50% war-tax rate in place in 1815.*

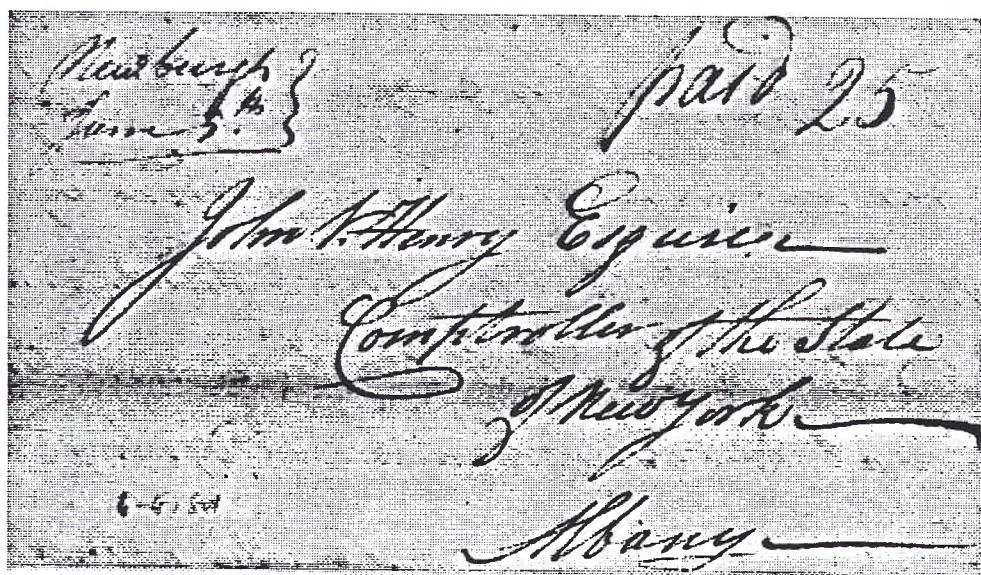
*The Goshen rate to Albany is 12-1/2 cents as it was less than 150 miles from that city. The Mount Hope FLS is rated at 10 cents as it was fewer than 80 miles from New York City. From 1816 through 1845 the rate for 31 to 80 miles was 10 cents. By the 1880's a three cent stamp covered postage anywhere in the United States.*

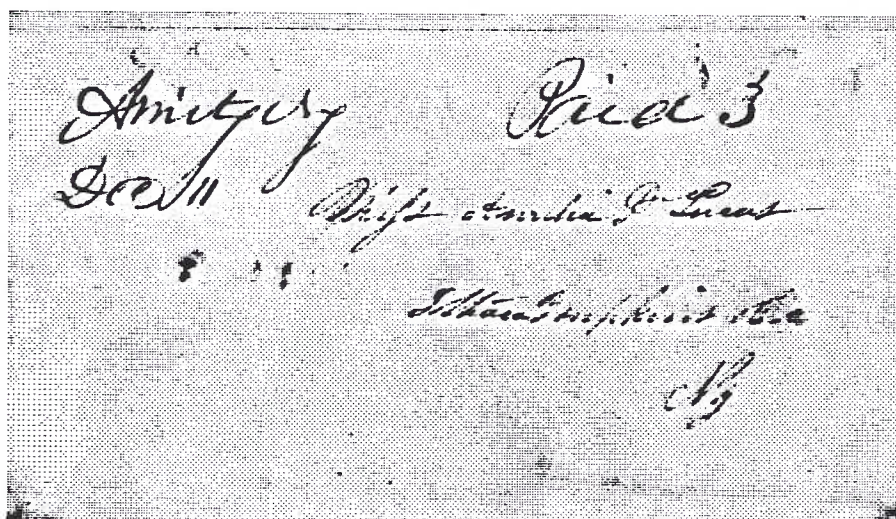

This is the earliest known cover from Orange County. The post office was established in 1795, the cover is dated June 5 1801.



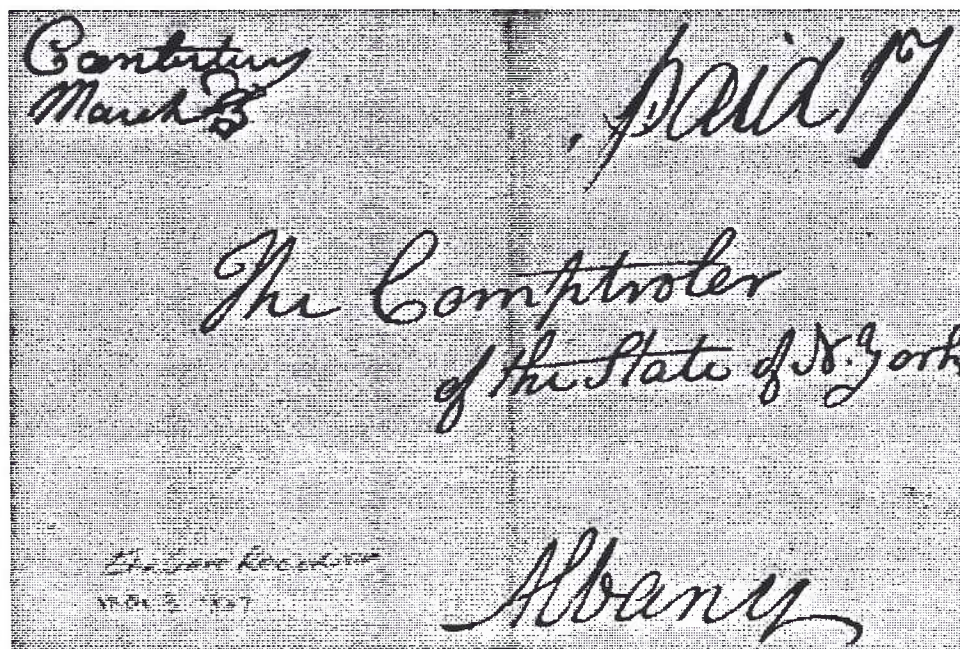
Although the amity Post Office was established in 1816, this, the earliest known use is from the 1840's (NYD)

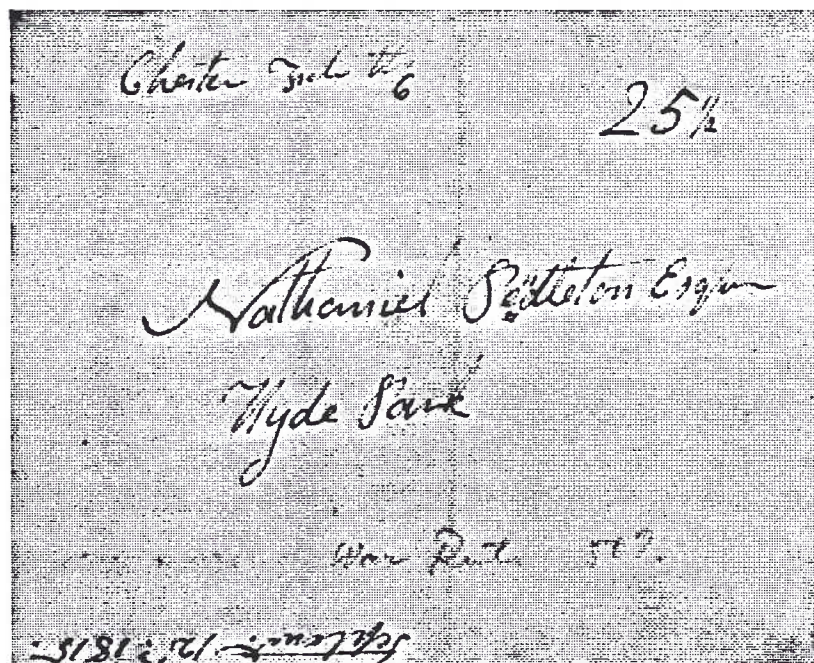

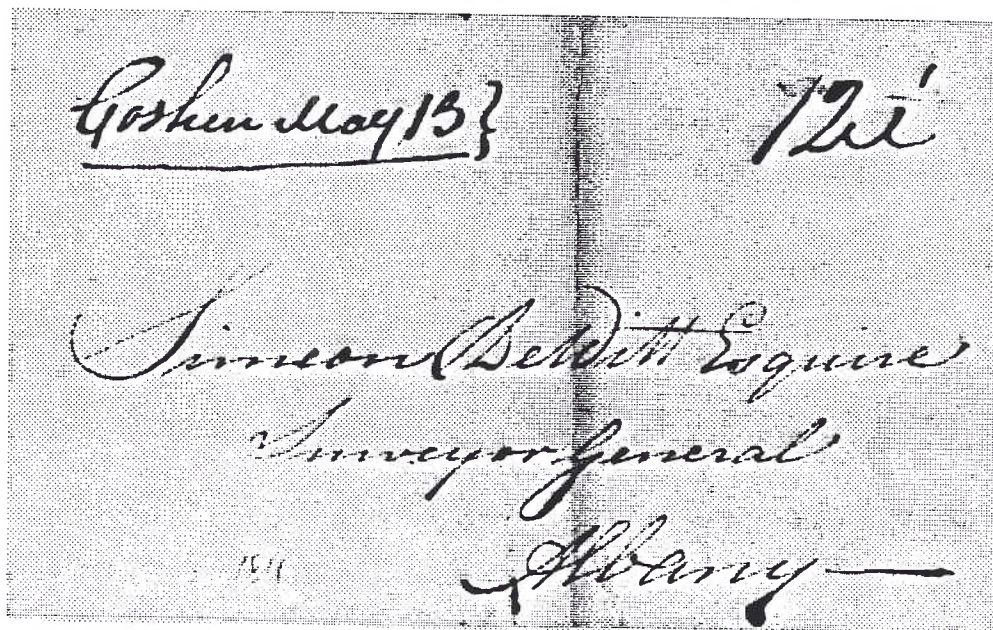
The EKU from Chester and a war-rate cover ( $17 + 8\frac{1}{2} = 25$  cents postage). The Chester Post Office was opened in 1797.

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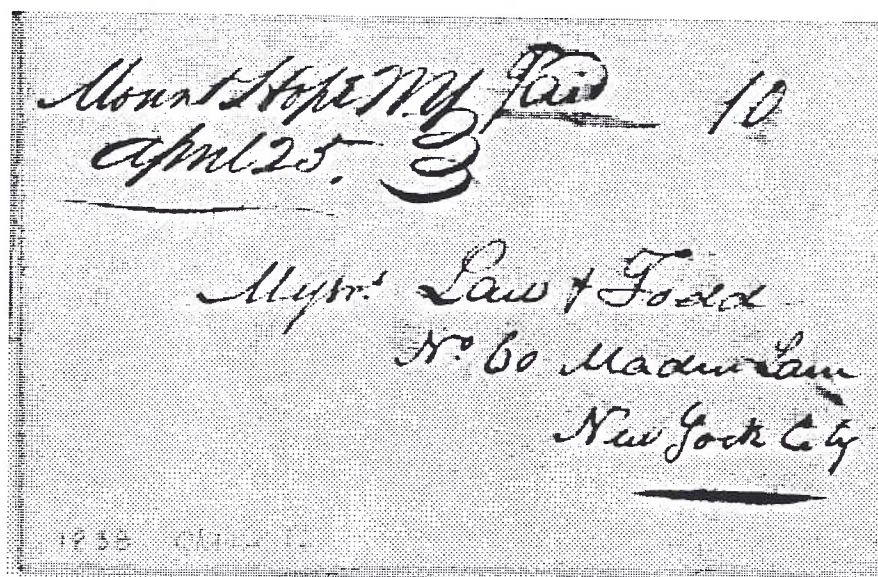

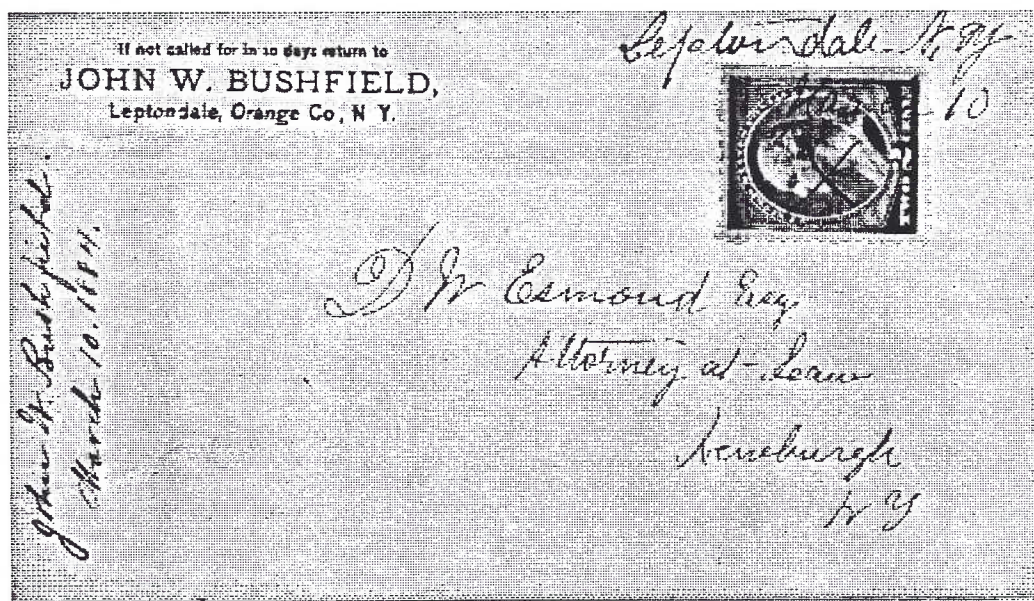

# U.S. EXPRESS MAIL

## ALBANY TO BUFFALO ROUTE

BY DR. LOUIS CALL

There are a number of railroad mail routes in the early postal history of our state that we know little about or that still have unanswered questions about them. One of the earliest of these is the U. S. Express Mail route from Albany to Buffalo in the 1840's.

What do we know about this route? Firstly, we know that the railroads involved were:

1. The Mohawk & Hudson (Albany to Schenectady)
2. The Utica and Schenectady
3. Syracuse & Utica
4. Auburn & Syracuse
5. Rochester & Syracuse
6. Buffalo & Rochester
7. Auburn & Rochester
8. Attica & Buffalo

All of these small railroads became the New York Central Railroad. Secondly, we know mail was carried over this route as early as May 20, 1837 (Albany to Utica) and by June 16, 1843 it was carried over the entire route from Albany to Buffalo.

We also know that route agents rode the trains putting off sacks of mail and picking up mail from stations and people along the way in the usual manner of "way" agents. Some letters were prepaid, but most were "collect at the other end" letters. These route agents used a number of cancels some were applied on the train and/or at the end points, Albany and Syracuse Post Offices. (I will write about these in a later article.) Most of these handstamps were without any specific indication of a particular route or railroad. They were simple variations of the word "Railroad". In addition to these hand stamps the collect letters were also, in many cases, inscribed with the name of the town from which the letter was placed in the mail.

Now comes the perplexing part; as that well known limerick puts it, "who did what-with which-and to whom?" and we can add "when?". Research by John Kay in the usual places has turned up nothing, but he is still looking. Other records also have yielded little except more questions. What we do know has come mostly from folded letters of the period with the cancellations and other markings on the outside.

Mr. Kay did find some parallel information about the Boston and New York Express Mail route and the Boston to Albany Mail route that may have some implications for the Albany to Buffalo U. S. Express Mail. This information is

as follows:

1. The Boston to New York Express Mail route was established July 21, 1842.

2. This route was under contract with Harden & Co.

3. On February 1, 1844, Post Office Department agents replaced the Harden & Co. employees.

4. The Boston and New York Express Mail via Long Island Sound was discontinued August 1, 1861 and became the Boston and New York (via Springfield) route.

5. The Boston to Albany route was established February 21, 1842.

6. This route was under contract with Harden & Co. also.

7. August 21, 1843 saw the Post Office take over the route and operate it with route agents until it became an R.P.O. on August 13, 1868.

8. Pomeroy & Co. (also successors) operated the Buffalo to Albany route with their private messengers carrying privately consigned mail and parcels.

Looking at these bits of information, we can now ask some questions about the Express Mail route across New York. When did it start? Certainly not before June 1843. Was it run by the Post Office Department from the beginning, or did an outside express company such as Harden or Pomeroy operate it? For how long? Why did this service end in 1847? Also, there is no information as to what followed it.

From the letters we have we can conclude the following information. The service started 1843 (August 9, 1843 earliest date I have seen - type 4) and mail was cancelled en route. Further, mail was picked up and sorted en route; then put off at the proper station. (A letter from Herkimer to Rome and letters from Little Falls to Cooperstown). The colors used were dark red (early 1843-4), orange red (1844-45), and blue (1846-7).

For many years it was thought that there was only one type of this marking (Towle 114-0-1). In working with Charlie Towle we felt there should be at least one more type, perhaps more. To date we have come up with three more types, all easily identified. Figures 1 through 4 illustrate these types. Blue markings are much scarcer than the red ones; as yet we have not seen types 2 and 3 in blue.

Much more is to be learned about these markings and this route. If you have anything to add, please write to me and I will pass it on.

## KENNEDY FIRST DAY CANCELLATIONS

BY HENRY B. SCHEUER

Postal history, cancellation studies and census-taking projects of known cancellations are most frequently made of scarce, elusive and certainly older philatelic material. The 5-cent John F. Kennedy stamp of 1964 has provided this collector with quite a lot of fun, attempting to track down as many city and town cancels, each bearing the day and year cancel of the first day of issue of the stamp: May 29, 1964.

This 1964 U.S. commemorative stamp was released nationwide simultaneously on May 29, 1964, with the "First Day of Issue" slogan cancellation available only in Boston. Throughout the country, collectors were able to purchase the stamp and obtain May 29 postmarks from as many cities as they wished. Several collectors prepared covers in quantity with the intent of building a trading inventory to trade with others.

In New York State, covers are known canceled from 293 different towns, cities and stations. See chart below for a list of these cancels.

This collector has often wondered if there was any pattern to the geographical distribution of these town cancels. Many counties, particularly in less populated areas of the state are

not represented. Quite expectedly, concentration of covers are known canceled from the larger cities and its immediate environs, throughout the state. A disproportionately large number are recorded from Erie county. Similarly, Long Island is well represented, with Suffolk at 75 and Nassau at 23. Town cancels from the Adirondacks are almost unknown, or at least not recorded as of this date.

This collector has been amassing such covers from throughout the country for almost a decade. Undoubtedly many, many more such covers exist. Quite unfortunately these covers are worth only pennies and are being or have been discarded. In addition to collector inspired covers, incoming commercial mail has been a source for uncovering more material.

There is lots of work remaining in this project. Please contact Mr. Scheuer with additional information and, when possible, photocopies of covers you know to exist from cities not listed here.

Should some of the officers be reimbursed for expenses incurred by attending these meetings? There is provision for these things in the club's constitution.

Should we continue to have a *Bulletin* which wins medals or is saving money a paramount consideration? Should we go for the Silver? Who is to decide: the editors, the Directors, the Treasurer? And can an expedient decision be made? What about a flexible budget for the Publications Committee, where the Committee can decide during the year how to allocate the moneys budgeted? You can't respond to changes and opportunities without flexibility re finances. It is not usually possible to foresee all the possibilities which may arise during a year although it is obvious that there must be a known set of priorities.

Plan to attend the Sidney meeting. The matters to be discussed are of concern to you and the Society. With goodwill on all sides we feel that everything can be settled amicably. But if you're not there, your views will not be included in the settlement.

# THE BLOSSBURG & CORNING RAILROAD AND TIOGA RAILROAD

Thanks to the kindness of member Henry T. Keutmann, we are now able to record an earlier route agent marking for this elusive pair of railroads that started business 150 years ago and commenced route agent service in 1852. Although we have names of route agents recorded from 10/28/1852 on, the Corning & Blossburg R.R. postmark shown herewith is earliest recorded. With no date slugs, the letter is fortunately dated by a contained letter dated May 25, 1873, from Lawrenceville, PA to Jasper, NY. Recording data is as follows:

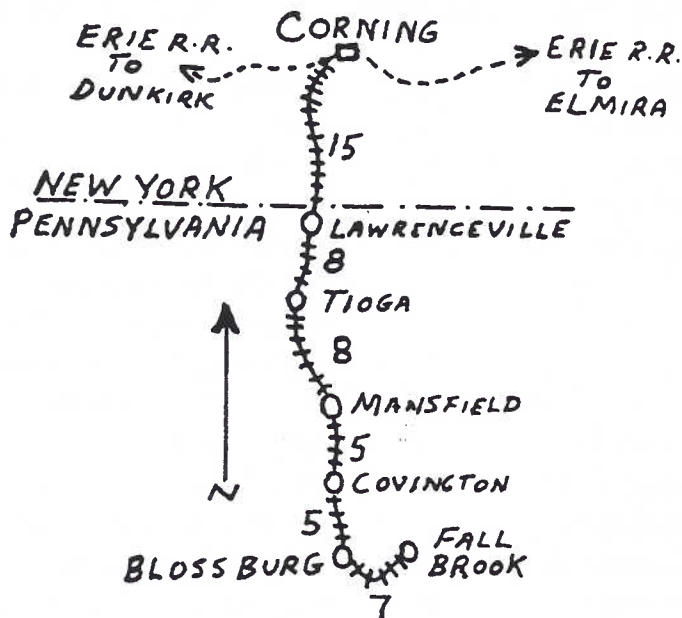


224-F-1; 27, black, 1873, NDS, VII

The location of usable bituminous coal near Blossburg, PA was known to developers from Revolutionary times. In 1833, New York State completed the Chemung Canal from Corning, NY east to Horseheads and then north to Seneca Lake at Watkins. At the north end of Seneca Lake, the Cayuga and Seneca Canal allowed barges to reach the main Erie Canal. The plan was to build a canal south to Blossburg but surveys soon ascertained the grades on the Tioga Creek were prohibitive. So the respective canal companies in New York State and in Pennsylvania were reorganized as railroads in 1833--the Corning & Blossburg R. R. in New York, Corning to State Line at Lawrenceville, PA, 15.6 miles, and the Tioga R. R. in Pennsylvania, from Lawrenceville, to Blossburg, 25.5 miles. The first train was operated Nov. 5, 1839. Apparently each railway had perpetual trackage rights over the other. On Mar. 19, 1854, the New York railroad was reorganized as the Blossburg & Corning R. R. The Fall Brook Coal Co. built a 7 mile line from its mines at Fall Brook to the Tioga R. R. at Blossburg in 1859.

A passenger train ran in each direction as early as 1851, connecting at Blossburg with a stage line to and from Williamsport, PA. Why the railway postal historians have never located a route agent postmark from the 1852-1873 period is a mystery, but it is a fertile field for the cover hunter. Possibly it is because we do not know what form the postmark would take -- Tioga, C&B, B&C or what. In the period following the Civil War the line handled heavy coal traffic. New York State had failed to maintain the Chemung Canal, so a connection was built to the Erie R.R. at Corning, and through coal runs, as many as four a day each way, were

run over the Erie to Coal Point on Seneca Lake, near Watkins, where coal was dumped into barges for distribution to points on the Erie Canal and Hudson River. Branches were built from the main line to the more distant coal fields in Pennsylvania. With better grade coal, and with the growth of the railway systems, the Blossburg & Corning R. R. was acquired by the Fall Brook Coal Co., which in turn became part of the New York Central System in 1899. The Tioga R. R. built a branch from Lawrenceville to Elmira, NY and was in turn then acquired by the New York, Lake Erie & Western R.R., part of the great Erie R. R. system. The 1839 joint use of the tracks, possibly the earliest known example in the U.S. continued throughout all these changes.

The schedule from the *WELLSBORO DEMOCRAT* of Oct. 20, 1869, just before our postmark period, was as follows:

**BLOSSBURG & CORNING AND TIOGA R.R.**  
On and after Monday, May 5th, trains run as follows:  
**MAIL TRAIN**, going South - Leaves Corning 8.00; Lawrenceville 9.03; Tioga 9.45; Mansfield 10.22; Covington 10.41 and arrives at Blossburg at 11 and Fall Brook 11.40 a.m.

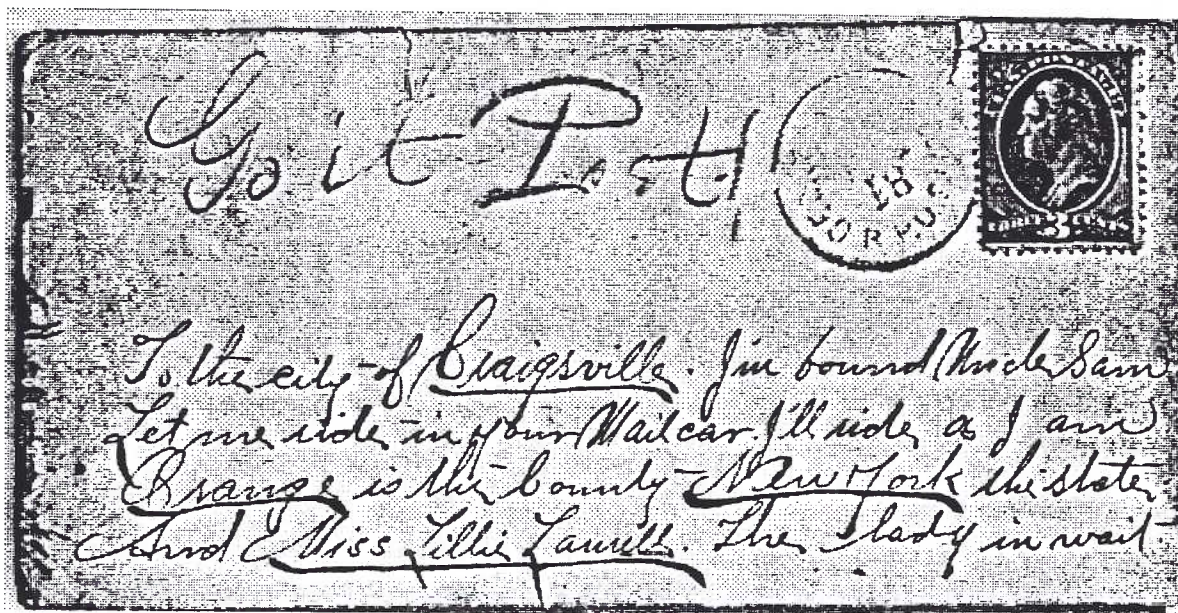
Mail train, going North - Leaves Fall Brook 2.15 p.m.; Blossburg 3.00; Covington 3.20; Mansfield 3.40; Tioga 4.18; Lawrenceville 5.00; and arrives at Corning 6.00 p.m.

Can you picture some bleary-eyed mail key operator keying away on his LSM console at 50 letters/minute at some GMF (a fancy euphemism for a postal sweatshop) and coming across a letter as illustrated. I wonder what must go through the mind for the split second he has to see the address with no zip numbers before he keys it to a separation to be hand worked later in the night. Not much different, I'll wager, than for a railway mail clerk speeding across Iowa on the CED. RAP & C. BLUFFS<sup>1</sup> R.P.O. back in 1878. I'm sure he took a moment out to show a fellow crew member the curious address before he handstamped the letter and cased it to a N.Y. State box.

Looking at this cover in today's light it seems a typical example of XIX Century naivete, well, perhaps innocence

would be a better word. The boundless trust that such a letter would be handled and delivered and that the "lady in wait" would be impressed by his manner would only cause a smirk on the face of today's youth. This is part of what makes postal history so fascinating; this is a real glimpse into the life of people as they wrote and received their mail. I'd like to end this piece with the way the writer closed out his letter, in a style that is all but forgotten,

"I Remain Ever Yours in Friendship,"

## MORE ON NEW YORK CITY CANCELLATION "FIRSTS"

By ROGER CURRAN

In the article on the above subject in the Winter 1990 *Bulletin* we asked: "Are any 1847 issue stamps known cancelled by the curved 'PAID'?" Such issues are herewith reported.

Lot 28 in the Siegel sale #482 in October 1972 was described as follows: "5c Dark Brown (1) ... tied by Bold Red 'PAID' in open arc on small piece ... scarce cancel on this stamp." The catalog contains a clear photograph of the lot and this writer is confident that it is the New York "PAID." Eight 10c examples cancelled by the curved PAID can also be reported. Does this sound like the result of diligent and extensive research? How about pure luck! First, all of the stamps are on one cover -- a double rate (40c x 2) cover from New York to San Francisco postmarked February 7 (1850). the writer came face-to-face with this spectacular item in an exhibit at World Stamp Expo in November [1990] and realized for the first time how those stamps were cancelled. We believe nine strikes of the red, curved PAID can be counted on the eight stamps. Creighton C. Hart, who has made an extensive study of the 1847 issue stamps, reported the following: "The slightly curved 'PAID' ... typical of the New York [P]ost [O]ffice ... is seen used as a canceler [sic] on a very few '47 stamps'".<sup>1</sup>

On another subject, it would probably be useful to briefly expand the discussion in the article of the square grid canceller. Two versions have been reported, one with 13 bars and the other with 11 bars. According to Hart, writing in 1969, only the 13-bar grid is noted on the hundreds of covers which he lists from New York City bearing 1847 issue stamps and the grid was only applied in red.<sup>2</sup> It seems very probable, therefore, that the 11-bar grid was issued after June 30, 1851. As far as the writer knows, the earliest report of a 13-bar grid in black is July 3, 1851.<sup>3</sup> In his 3c 1851-1857 book, Chase noted some overlapping of use of red and black ink colors by New York when applying the square grid. (In this context he didn't differentiate between the 13- and 11-bar grids.) All of this leads to a couple of additional questions to add to those in the first article:

- How late is the 13-bar grid noted?
- How early is the 11-bar grid noted?

Any comments or reports will be welcomed.

PREPARED BY ROBERT J. STETS

This book delivers what its title promises. It lists all the post offices, their postmasters and the amounts of postage collected. It includes a copy of the Post Office Law enacted by Congress on May 8, 1794. Lastly, and perhaps most importantly, it lists the private post offices operating in New York and Pennsylvania.

"The revenue from these private offices was remitted to the contractor, and not to the General Post Office. ... They were however offices at which mail could be received from or dispatched to other post offices operated under the Postmaster General."

The seven "private" post offices in New York State were: Bath, Williamsburg (near Buffalo), Catskill, Chenango, Harperfield, Newtown Point, Oliont and Owego. There are four pages of text in reference to this operation and a map showing the routes.

The list of 1794 post offices is given alphabetically for the country and by state. Among the busiest offices in New York State were: New York City with quarterly postage collected revenues of \$4,635; Albany at \$290; Lansingburg with \$67; Hudson and Whitestown at \$50; Cooperstown at \$33; and Schenectady and Poughkeepsie at \$28. All the rest had less. There were 37 post offices across the state, five of which did not report.

Other post offices with revenues of over \$1,000 were: Philadelphia, \$6,314; Baltimore, \$2,936; Boston, \$2,640; Richmond, \$1,163; and Norfolk at \$1,048. Virginia was the only state to have two post offices with revenues over \$1,000. Vermont had only one post office with revenue of as much as \$25, Windsor.

The post road from Boston to New York City listed no post offices between Stamford, CT and New York, NY. The NYC to Albany run lists the following post office stops going north: Peekskill, Fishkill, Poughkeepsie, Rhinebeck, Redhook, Clermont, Hudson and Kinderhook.

The book, which is soft covered, is nicely bound and covered in plastic. Most of the type is large and readily readable. The copy of the 1794 law is in smaller type but still clear and legible.

Priced at \$7.90, the book is absurdly inexpensive for a work on postal history of this quality. It can be obtained, postpaid from the author at PO Box 142, Walterboro, SC 29488.

Anyone having any interest in this period should buy this book. New York postal historians, who are interested in learning about the private post roads and post offices of our state should snap the book up. Mr. Stets told me at Stampshow '91 that he didn't have many left and once sold out the price will go straight up.

### DUES ARE DUE FOR 1991-1992

## PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO BY-LAWS RE DUES INCREASE FOR 1992-1993

The Board of Directors of the ESPHS has approved the Treasurer's recommendation that the By-Laws be amended to increase the annual dues of the Society from \$5 to \$10 starting with the 1992-1993 society fiscal year. In accordance with Art. 6 of the Constitution, the By-Laws may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the Society by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the membership casting ballots, provided notice of the proposed change is given at least 30 days prior to such meeting. Members have the privilege of casting ballots for such amendments by mail.

This serves as the 30 day notice, prior to the October 13, 1991 semi-annual meeting of the ESPHS to take place at CINCOPEX in Sidney, NY.

The proposed amendment is to Section 4 of Article 2 of the E.S.P.H.S. By-Laws. The amended section would read:

"Section 4. The annual dues for membership shall be [Five Dollars (\$5.00)] Ten Dollars (\$10.00); applicants filing in the second half of the year shall be charged one-half the annual rate for that year. All dues submitted with an application shall be refunded if the applicant is not accepted as a member."

Members wishing to vote by mail shall mail their ballot, on any paper and in any format, to ESPHS, P.O. Box 5475, Albany, NY 12205 so that the ballot is delivered by October 11, 1991.

Approval of the dues increase is recommended in light of the current costs of operating the Society and of producing and mailing the *Bulletin*. Last year, 1990-1991, saw a net decrease in Society funds of \$796.06. A further decrease is expected for the current 1991-92 year. Whereas in past years, income from interest has enabled the Society to operate in the black, costs have escalated substantially so that an erosion of our financial situation will continue without additional income. The Board also recognizes that the current \$5 per year dues has not changed in 25 years, and is simply not adequate to finance our *Bulletin* and other operations today.

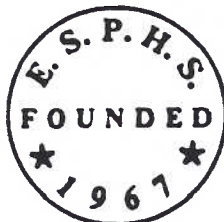
