I am definitely looking forward to our fall membership meeting at the Holiday Inn in Syracuse, just off Carrier Circle (Thruway Exit 35). The meeting will be held at 2 pm on Saturday, November 8, in the Atrium area adjacent to the Syracuse Stamp, Coin & Collectibles Show scheduled for November 8 & 9.

Our speaker for the meeting, following a short business session, will be the Society's newest Board member, David Przepiora, formerly of Cheektowaga and now residing in East Aurora, NY. David has been a Society member and postal history collector for many years and will talk on "Buffalo Postal History."

David retired from the Cheektowaga Police Department in September 2007 but still serves as president of the Cheektowaga Historical Association. While an active member of the Police Department he co-authored the history of the Department found on its website, www.town.cheektowaga.ny.us/police/history.html.

Following David's talk and any follow-up questions or discussion, the meeting's "desert" will be the viewing and voting in our annual four-page exhibit competition. PLEASE BRING TO THE MEETING FOUR PAGES OF CONNECTED N.Y. POSTAL HISTORY TO BE DISPLAYED ON A TABLE FOR THE KENNETH R. DELISLE AWARD. The winner is determined by vote of those present. The deLisle Award is a handsome walnut plaque outline of New York State, suitably engraved, to be presented to the 2008 winner at the 2009 annual meeting.

As another positive looking forward, the second issue of *Excelsior!* by its new editor, David Williams, should be received prior to, or concurrent with, this *Bulletin*. It went to the publisher (Drew Nicholson) by digital transmission September 30 for printing and mailing. This will be the September 07 issue of our semi-annual journal.

The Lure of Slogan Cancellations

Many collectors focus on collecting covers from a certain county, town, stamp issue, or type of cancel. In looking for these older issues much modern postal history is left by the wayside and can be picked up quite reasonably. One such area of interest is slogan cancellations, which first appeared in the 1930s. Their heyday was the 1960s. They started to be phased out by the 1990s.



A slogan cancellation is a type of special die used in conjunction with a machine cancellation. Most of the major machine cancelers, such as American, Universal, Barry, Columbia, and International, used slogans. The slogan is usually found to the right of the circular date stamp on the cancel and, in many cases, enclosed in a box, or between parallel lines. Slogan cancellations often had a public-service message, such as *Pray for Peace*, *Loose*



Dogs Will Bite, and the humorous *Fight Your Insect Enemies* were typical. Most slogans were limited to a maximum of three lines, with fewer than 20 letters per line.

Groups and organizations could apply for slogan cancels for events considered to be of general public interest and importance, but not for-profit undertakings. Most slogans were used for about a six-month period. Very few specialized town slogans are found on current mail with the switch to regional mail centers, and the ones that are, are now often sprayed across the face of the stamp. The *John Adams Power of the Letter* slogan appeared on mail this spring in conjunction with a television miniseries on HBO.

I have started compiling a database of slogans used in just New York State, i.e., specific to its towns, not those used nationally. For example, Poughkeepsie had a cancel for the Centennial of Vassar College in 1961. Little Falls had a cancel for its 150th anniversary. The United States Postal Slogan Catalog by Moe Luff is a superb reference regarding these cancels, but was last revised in 1975, so there are many modern ones that are unreported. Do you have any interesting slogan cancels in your collection?
