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DOMESTIC AIR MAIL RATES

Beginning in 1937 the July number of the US Postal Guide appears in two parts: Part I "Domestic": governing domestic mail rates, regulations, procedures and etc., along with a list of post offices; and Part 2: "International": propounding the details necessary to despatch mail matter internationally. Beginning also following 1 July 1934, the so called domestic airmail rate was lowered from 8¢ first ounce / 13¢ each additional ounce, to 6¢ per ounce and is generally thought to have remained that way until 26 March 1944 when it was raised to 8¢ per ounce. But that was within the continental US. In the July 1941 US Postal Guide Part I "Domestic" the following air mail postal rates are listed:

In order to obtain the fullest measure of service for the postage paid at the air-mail rate, air mail should be sent special delivery. Matter sent by airplane reaches the office of address sooner than if sent by train, but when it gets there after the last regular carrier trip of the day of its arrival, delivery is not made until the following business day, unless sent special delivery and the fee therefor paid in addition to the air-mail postage.

The fees chargeable on air mail for special-delivery service are the same as those which apply when such mail is sent by other than air mail, as follows:



MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING UTICA, N.Y. May 3, 1981

The Annual Meeting of the Empire State Postal History Society was called to order at 1:30 PM by President Emma Koberg, with 30 members and 3 guests in attendance. President Koberg welcomed the members and guests and declared a quorum to be present. First on the agenda was the approval of minutes of the meeting held May May 4, 1980, as published in the Bulletin in June. Unanimous approval was voted.

The Secretary read his annual report, printed in abbreviated form elsewhere in this issue. The Treasurer's annual report was read, also summarized in this bulletin. There was a brief discussion and explanation, after which it was moved, seconded and voted to approve.

Membership chairman Tuttle read his report. There was some discussion on ways and means to better publicize the Society and its purposes. The consensus seemed to be that more and better promotion at local and regional shows in New York State would be the most productive method to increase membership which has been static for the past two or three years. Tuttle also read his report on awards given by the Society, a program which has been in effect for some time.

Next, Publication Committee chairman Seifert presented his report. He reported the adoption of a new "logo" to be used on the bulletin as soon as possible. Although the design with an outline map of the State of New York was voted the most popular, Seifert discovered at the State Department a restriction on any design resembling a state department or official seal, except on a royalty basis. We were not prepared to get into this arrangement for a simple logo.

Seifert also reported a steady sale of publications. He acknowledged the assistance of our past director Nick Todaro, who furnished a supply of New York State Post Office pocket lists at no cost to us. We are in the process of preparing a new roster, said the chairman, expected to be completed before Fall. Our New York State Manuscript Post Office book is in revision, no completion date was stated. The committee is also looking into the early publication of a book on Wayne County, to match our publication on Ontario County.

Seifert paid tribute to Bulletin Editor Jack Haefeli, who began his tenure at the start of the fiscal year, producing six bi-monthly issues. Some of the innovations included the club auction as an inclusive feature rather

than a separate mailing; running a "trading post" which has been popular; featured a new section on shows around the state, etc. The attempt to obtain dealer advertising was not successful, only two of our dealer-members supported the effort. More new features are to be introduced in the coming year.

Auction chairman Bernadt gave a short report, pointing out that the only thing which can prevent an improving auction is lack of good material. George reports that in the \$5.00 to \$50.00 range, no auction can beat ours. He repeated the fact that popular material, with quality appearance will never lack bidders.

Next came a discussion on the status of our library. President Koberg reported the action of the Executive Board, which has already authorized the dispersal of its contents by direct sale or auction. After some discussion as to the best method for sale, it was moved by Seifert, seconded by Wilcox, that the contents of the library having any value would be dispersed through our own auction or auctioned at the national level at the discretion of the auction manager. On voting, carried. (Footnote)

At this point President Koberg asked for a motion of confidence. It was moved by Anton Zahm, seconded by Gerald Bookhop, that the actions of the officers and Executive Board in the past fiscal year be ratified and approved, subject to the usual audit of the Treasurer's records. On vote, unanimously approved.

The President than called for ratification of election of three Executive Board members-atlarge (directors) for a three year term. The secretary reported the unopposed slate of Henry Chlanda, William Hart and Robert Waite, posted in the April Bulletin. He was instructed to cast one ballot for this slate and the new members, all present, were welcomed to the Board.

Under new business, the treasurer reported on the proposed budget, approved by the Executive Board for presentation at this meeting. (The figures separately presented in this bulletin) There was general approval of the purpose and content of the budget.

President Koberg than brought to the floor the subject of amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws, recommended at the Executive Bd meeting in April.

Very briefly, the proposed changes would allow a President succession for one term after the first, a circumstance which is denied formally but happens informally.

Also, there will be a clarification as to the number of Board members constituting a quorum. The duties of the finance committee and the introduction of language authorizing an annual budget are proposed.

The President stated these changes would be spelled out and presented to the membership, quite likely in the August Bulletin, so that a proper vote can be taken by the membership as a whole.

On this note the meeting was adjourned. The President thanked all those in attendance for their cooperation and advice and wished them a pleasant summer. Our Fall meeting will be held as usual, time and place in the Bulletin.

Footnote: In discussing the dispersal of our library, the 50-reel microfilm record of the Letters Sent by the Postmaster General were specifically excluded. Both the Executive Bd and the members present believe ways can be found to make them more accessible and valuable to our membership.

SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT

(A condensed record of the annual report read at the Society's Annual Meeting).

During the 1980-81 fiscal year the Society held its annual meeting on May 4. Minutes of this meeting were published in the June 1980 Bulletin, together with the result of annual balloting for vacancies on the Exec. Board.

A second meeting was held on October 5, 1980, A second meeting was neid on october 3, 1900, less formal than the annual gathering. No minutes were taken, the session being given over to swapping and socializing. Both meetings were held at Karatt's, our usual locale just outside the City of Utica, N.Y.

The Executive Board of the Society met twice during the year, once on May 4 prior to the general membership meeting and again prior to the meeting of October 5. Necessary Society business was transacted at both meetings, and minutes are on file with the Secretary. In a departure from past practice the Board voted to hold its opposed meeting in decimal of the to hold its annual meeting in advance of the annual membership meeting and did convene in

Utica on April 5, 1981. Such a change permits the board members to work on a 1981-82 budget and other matters in time for discussion at our regular annual membership meeting.

Membership in the Society remained static in 1980-81, with a net gain of only 3 members. We regret to report the passing of long-time stalwarts Lewis Gracey and PP Lee DeGraff.

Our publication, publicity and awards committees were extremely active during the year and will report separately. The <u>Bulletin</u> appeared regularly and on schedule in June, August, October, December, February and April. Each issue included a mail auction, from which revenue was derived to assist in Bulletin publication cost.

The mailing list at April 30, 1981 stood at 169 members, 3 subscribers, 6 exchange and 2 courtesy mailings.

Finally, one regional meeting was held during the year, in Albany on Feb. 15, 1981. It is the strong recommendation of the Executive Board that this type of meeting serves the interest of the Society in a positive way and should be encouraged in each geographical region of the State of New York.

BUDGET FOR 1981 - 1982

The following budget was drawn up at the semi-annual meeting of the Executive Board held on April 5, 1981 with an approved resolution that it be submitted to the general membership at the Society's Annual Meeting.

The only major item of revenue and expense not taken into consideration above is that of publications. This is, over the long run, self- supporting as the records show and for budgetary purposes is neither an item of revenue nor of expense.

Since this is the first deficit budget in our history, a word of explanation. The purpose of the Society is not to pile up a bank account, although making money is no mean feat in these inflationary times. However, it was the sense of the discussions at the Executive Board meeting that we could more positively support the cause of postal history and New York State postal history in particular by a new program of support to shows and exhibitions within our state. Awards and Publicity Committee Chairman Clifford Tuttle and President Emma Koberg should be contacted for details.

AWARDS AND MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN REPORT FOR MAY - DEC 1980 to APRIL 30, 1981

During the past year the awards and the membership programs have been some what combined, since they both strive toward the same end to "enlarge the membership"

For sake of clarification I will seperate the awards progress for the past year from the membership endeavor.

Altho a number of exhibitions were given the opportunity to use our awards only five responded or could qualify. They being:

- Cobleskill--First certificate of merit which went to the Grand award winner.
- Cooperstown Oneonta combined show --Four postal history exhibits, Two certificates of merit given out.
- 3. CINCOPEX -- Sherrill, N.Y. Eight postal history exhibits in their show. Two award trophys given in addition to two certificates of merit.
- 4. ROPEX -- Rochester, N.Y. Asked for two certificates of merit. Only one was awarded and that went to Anton Zahm for his exhibit of "Salina, N.Y. Postal Markings".
- 5. FOPEX -- Albany April 10-12. The ESPHS major Award went to Anton Zahm, for his village of Salina, N.Y. postal markings also a show Gold Medal. The certificates of merit were awarded by the judges: (1 To Zahm for the same exhibit and (2) Dr Louis T Call for his Railroad Postal Markings of New York State. Call also was awarded a show silver. Anton Zahm was awarded the A.P.S. Award for "German New Guinea"

An extensive membership program was begun during the past year. Ads were placed in two of the philatelic journals and some articles were also used. The results were not as good as hoped for. 21 answers were received but not all for application blanks. 7 new members were signed up and requests for data and application blanks are still coming in. A number of application blanks and information sheets were made available at FOPEX and we plan to continue this in the coming exhibitions.



From the US mainland to the Philippine Islands, the airmail postage was 50¢, special delivery: "In order to obtain the fullest measure of service for the postage paid at the air mail rate, air mail should be sent special delivery." - 10¢ up to 2 pounds for first class.

The above letter mailed to the Editor of the Manila Herald proves this combination of rates, 50¢ for the "Via Air Mail" and "Fee Paid10 cents" for the "...Special Delivery" posted 30 December 1941 at Corpus Christi, Texas. But the Japanese had struck the Philippines at the same time as they had struck the Hawaiians, with as disastrous effect, and by 2 January 1942 had entered Manila - MacArthur preparing his final stand at Bataan and Corregidor.

"Passed by Censor" but "Returned to Sender/Service Suspended".

I'm sure that many of those fine members who have cooperated so wonderfully in sending us material for our auctions have frequently wondered why it took so long for same to appear in a sale!

As you must realize, those of us who put these things together (auctions, bulletins, etc) have other obligations to fullfil (family, etc) -- Also, since 2 separate operations are involved (the preparation of the auction and the preparation, printing, etc of the Bulletin) proper coordination between the two is essential if the Bulletin is to be out on time. Therefore, it is necessary that I have the auction sale list in our Bulletin editors hands from 5 to 7 weeks before publication date.

Sometimes other considerations interfere, in anticipation of which, the auction must be made up 2 or 3 months early

There is also the fact that in order to have as many vendors as possible participate in each sale, I try to limit a single seller to 10 or 15 lots, depending on the amount and quality of the material on hand. This has the effect of further lengthening the interval between my receipt of your lots and the appearance of some of them in a sale. SO --- please, please, bear with me.

I would like to reiterate, that as usual, we MEED GOOD POSTAL HISTORY material. A glance at prices realized and at the description of the lots they represent, will quickly show you that good material sells well while the poorer has to be bunched in order to draw any bids at all!!

Please, no post-1940 FDCs or special events cachets.
