


STAR CANCELS OF N.Y.S.

DR. WILLIAM REINER-DEUTSCH

Although not active in our organization, he was a mainstay of The Postal History Society (formerly Postal History Society of the Americas), serving many years as their treasurer (1964-1981) after his term as President 1962-64. From 1958 until his death he acted as associate editor of the prestigious Postal History Journal, a responsibility which included that most difficult of editorial tasks, finding the authors of scholarly articles.

ROYDEN H. LOUNSBERY

Dick, as he was affectionately known to a multitude of friends, passed away on March 6, 1982 after a short illness.

He was one of the original members of the ESPHS and a strong supporter of our efforts to gather and reduce to paper the postal history of New York State. He was a contributor to <u>Excelsior</u> in its early years and an unfailing attendant, with his wife Millicent, at our regular meetings.

Dick had an excellent knowledge of the postal markings of NYS which he shared without reservation when we needed information. As one of the members who worked with Lee DeGraff on the original compilation of the Manuscript Post Office book he was a major source of original discovery and definitive datings.

It was not just in the field of NY State postal markings that he excelled, for his main interest was in the postal history and strikes of our country from its earliest days. From the Colonial and early American periods through the stampless and early stamped periods his fine collection took awards at both national and international exhibitions, as well as lending a touch of class to regional shows.

However well Dick was known as a postal history scholar and collector, he will be best remembered as a quiet, unpretentious gentleman and greatly missed.

ANNUAL MEETING - MAY 2, 1982

The annual meeting of the Society was called to order by Pres. Koberg at approx. 2:30 PM in the lobby of Karrat's. Due to circumstances beyond our control. space which we occupied for the Board meeting and the morning bourse was pre-empted and no other suitable location was available. We therefore conducted short meeting dealing in essentials only.

Minutes of the 1981 annual meeting set forth in the June 1981 Bulletin were approved as distributed. Motion was made and seconded to ratify all actions of the officers and executive board for the year ending April 30, 1982. The Treasurer made a brief report, stating the full record would be printed in the June 1982 issue of the Bulletin.

The nominating committee ratified results of the nominating procedure stated in the last Bulletin. Pres. Koberg, noting there were no further nominations, instructed the Secretary to cast one vote for candidates Proulx, Sweeting and Wilcox, who were then declared duly elected as directors-at-large for a three year term expiring April 30, 1985.

The President then called the members' attention to the new 1982-1983 budget, which had received support of the Exec. Board at their morning session. There was no debate; moved, seconded and unanimously voted it be adopted. (Secty Note: Budget appears in detail elsewhere in this issue with appropriate notes.)

Short announcements were made regarding auctions (more material welcomed, we are short of material, not buyers); forthcoming publications (details to be printed in the Bulletin in due course); a roster is almost ready, funds in the budget to get it rolling; etc. Editor Jack Haefeli asked again that members having material which might make an interesting article or even a short filler, forward to him. Re-writing and composition will be done by our staff - we need the basic data.

Meeting was ajourned on the note that a non-business meeting will be held Oct. 3, time and place to be announced later.

1982 - 1983 BUDGET

By the Constitutional amendment passed in 1981, it is required that the Board of Directors (Executive Board) approve a budget, to be voted on at the annual meeting. At the May 2 meeting, it was announced the following budget had been approved by the Board:

During the discussion that followed, it was pointed out this was a "worst-case" deficit and that in no way did the Executive Board anticipate this would be the true case. For example, should the new revised manuscript book be printed, the revenue of \$500.00 represents only a partial reduction of inventory, many copies to be held over to 1983-84. The same applies to the Wayne County book. Additionally, this "worst-case" budget envisions a heavy withdrawal of savings to finance printing, with a deep reduction of interest. Unless both books are published simultaneously, revenues from one will finance printing of the other.

The budget passed by unanimous voice vote.

SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT FISCAL YEAR 1981 - 1982

Condensation of full report made to the Executive Board May 2, 1982 and on file with the Secretary's records.

Annual meeting held May 3, 1981 with minutes published in June 1981 issue. Second meeting of the year held at Utica on October 2, 1981 for which the minutes were taken and published in our December 1981 Bulletin.

In addition to the two general meetings there was a regional meeting in Albanyon February 21, 1982 as well as the late summer meeting in Bainbridge, N.Y. held on August 30, 2981.

The Executive Board of the Society met twice, on April 5 and on October 4, at our usual Utica location.

The Bulletin was issued six times on our bi-monthly schedule. Each issue contained articles of postal history interest, membership data, official records and other items. Of great use is the "Trading Post" feature utilized by one quarter of more of the membership. The regular auction continues to attract a loyal following, net revenue from which contributes to support of the Bulletin.

During 1981-82 we admitted 13 members, reinstated 3 and there are 6 pending applications. We dropped 13 for non-payment of dues, accepted 4 resignations and suffered loss of 2 through death. The net gain was three members.

Other activities are reported by the respective chairmen.
