UNCLE JESSE'S DEPOT By J.Fred Rodriguez


Reading over some of my Huntington Long Islander newspapers from the turn of the century, has revealed some interesting bits of news related to local postal history. A few original news clips are depicted below accompanied by appropriate illustrations.

Papers have been sent on to Washington to be made out preparatory to the establishment of a new post office at Huntington station of the Long Island Railroad to be called Fair Ground

July 11, 1890

The post office at Huntington depot to be known as Fairground will open for business on Sept. 1st.

August 30, 1890





According to the recently published edition of New York State Post Offices, the Fairground P.O. was established on July 24, 1890. The above news clip indicated that the actual first day of operations was on September 1 or 38 days after the establishment of the p.o. The post office only required a small corner of A. Pettit's store on New York Avenue across from the railroad station. Pettit's store, dealing in grains, feeds, and foodstuffs, was the largest commercial establishment in the Huntington Station vicinity. Due to its ideal location it was the logical place for the newly established p.o. with Albert S. Pettit as its first postmaster.

The Huntington Station vicinity was known as Fair Ground, the site of Huntington's race track which was just south of the station. Fairground Ave. running southward from the depot to Pulaski Rd. is a present day reminder of what was there long ago. The grounds were the site for various County Agricultural Fairs, popular horseracing events, and the temporary home for the visiting circus. The post card view shown in the next page gives us a glimpse of the beautiful race track. The Huntington Historical Society has a fine collection of panoramic views of events held there.

The Fairground post office continued in operation until its name was changed to the more popular Huntington Station. It continued in Pettit's store when the name was changed on August 24, 1912, but by then Hattie A. Pettit, Albert's daughter, took charge of the mails as the postmistress. New Name for Fairground.

From the present outlook the name Fairground for the Huntington Depot settlement will shortly be a thing of the past. A petition was recently sent to the Post Office Department at Washington, requesting that the name be changed to Huntington Station, inspectors were sent out here and when they learned the circumstances, thought the name of the settlement should be less misleading than it is at present. As neither Postmasters Hawkins or Petiti raise any objections to the change it is thought that the name of Huntington Station will shortly be authorized by the Department at Washington.
