A New Meaning for Holiday Spray

When one thinks of postal history, one very often thinks in terms of old letters and covers. Hundred-year-old covers with mixed frankings and interesting postmarks are fascinating, but so is a lot of mail from the last 10 years. I confess I am a *modern* postal history fanatic. Going through dollar boxes for the philatelic gems of the future is something I love to do.

Holiday Spray markings are one modern topic that I find fascinating. For those of you unfamiliar with spray markings they are ink jet sprayed markings that are printed in a straight line either across or through the postmark at the top of a cover. They often contain the date, city, time, zip code, etc. from the cover's city of origin.

Many spray markings are just informational. The ones I find most interesting contain additional text. Fun holiday messages are often



the subject of the text. For example, *Happy New Year 1993, First Night Pittsburgh, Have a Safe Halloween Boo!, Happy Thanksgiving from Dayton OH, and Happy Holidays* are just a few of the interesting markings that can be found in sprays.

My favorite and most unusual example comes from Hawaii. What makes it so is that it contains a spelling error: *Sasons Greetings Honolulu*. Are there other mistyped greetings?

Spray markings also exist on Canadian covers. In fact some of the Canadian sprays are quite amusing. Such as this *Santa Ho Ho Père Noel* spray that adorns this recently used cover.

Do any holiday spray markings exist on covers from New York towns? I have yet to find one. Keep your eyes peeled.
