

## **Chapter 10: Boston**

The town of Milton, just outside Boston, had been a bastion of paper-making since colonial times. Further up the Charles River lay the town of Newton Falls, which had numerious paper mills and became something of a proving ground for the latest machinery from England. Postal history of the paper mills are rather scarce, with most concerning Boston's paper-maker warehouses, commission paper warehouses and numerous paper dealers.



## **Chapter 11: Connecticut & New England**

Most postal history of this region is related to paper machinery and paper mills. Connecticut had been responsible for most of the American innovations in paper machines and associated equipment. The paper mills of New England were thus the direct beneficiary of this activity.

Most all USPO stamp, stationery and postal card paper was made in Connecticut and Massachusetts.




